**Rochesterian Rally to Aid  
Lithuanians \$10,000 Drive**

Support of Rochesterians for the \$10,000 fund-raising drive to aid Lithuanians in displaced persons' camps in Europe, was assured at the rally held Monday night, June 9, at St. George's Hall with a record attendance.

"People in America are sensitive to the situation in Europe," declared the presiding Bishop Kerecnyi. "However, the chief aim of the drive is to let us consider Europe, we see we are very poor, we know we are not going to be hungry, our children won't waste away before us."

"After all, the virtue of giving is not in giving what we don't need, it is in sacrifice. If there ever was any group representative of those whom Jesus meant when He said when you give to the least of my little ones, you give to me," it is these helpless victims of powers stronger than they."

**Remembered At Mass**

The people can very easily give way to despair if they think they are forgotten. It is going to be a great consolation, a great impulsion to carry on when they know there are people in America who are helping them. Tomorrow in my Mass I shall remember you whose generosity makes this campaign an important success."

Officially launching the campaign was the Rev. J. B. Konius, D. D., national President of the United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America.

"The plight of these displaced persons is worse than the fate of prisoners in a filthy jail," he said.

"They live in overcrowded DP camps never knowing how much longer they may be the next day. They are living among foreigners who themselves have no place to live. They are used for propaganda and for political purposes."

"Their only salvation lies in the generosity of Americans, because their own brethren in Lithuania are powerless to help them. We must fight for their cause constantly but we must also keep them alive so they can live to enjoy the future."

Nolan Leads Support

William T. Nolan of Rochester Catholics aiding the drive said: "The lack of happiness is a mark of Europe. This is due to lack of food. Any help we can give, we must."

Professor Pranas Padalskis speaking with first-hand experience declared: "I have been in Lithuania during all of its occupations and I have a moral obligation to tell of the plight of these unfortunate people. Those still living in Lithuania are feeling."
