

Divorce Courts For Quebec Hit By Hierarchy

Quebec, Que. (NC) — Opposition to the introduction of divorce courts in Quebec is being voiced by the hierarchy of the Roman Catholic Church. The bishops of Quebec have issued the following statement:

"Noting the increasing facility of divorce and the growing number of divorces, recognizing the harm and disorder to individuals and society caused by the divorce, and the harm to the family, the bishops of Quebec, again recall that divorce is contrary to the unchangeable law of God, condemned by Christ and proclaimed by the Church."

"As a result, they oppose the introduction of any divorce tribunal or court, and condemn all legislation which would tend to weaken the indissolubility of the matrimonial contract, and which would lead in any way to the rupture of the perpetual bond of marriage."

U. S. Strives to Lift Curtain in Korea

News — The United States and Soviet Russia are confronting each other across a conference table as well as across a boundary line these days in Korea.

If they reach an agreement, it may mean fewer obstacles, more peace and more democracy for the Catholics in northern Korea. Since the Russians entered that region at the end of the war, no foreign missionaries have been allowed to return there. Communism has been increasingly promoted and, while freedom of religion has been proclaimed, the pressure is against Christianity.

After 40 years of iron rule by military dictatorship, the Koreans expected independence when Japan surrendered. But at the end of the war the Russians entered from the north, Indians in preliminary looking and waiting, then setting down to occupy the country as far as the north parallel. They created a Communist Government, a Communist Committee, the Soviet P. O. S. a Committee, through which they rule.

The United States forces landed in Southern Korea to take over from the Japanese. They set up a military government but have worked steadily toward the goal of an independent representative Korean government. They have held popular elections, local and regional. South Korea now has an elected legislative body with real, though still limited, powers.

The Americans are shifting more and more administration to Korean shoulders. While one Korean political party has a monopoly in the Soviet zone, in the American zone all political parties are free to try anything except violence and fraud.

I was present when the Americans had, anti-Communist forces, and they had been attacked by anti-Soviet demonstrators. Without a permit and heaved some bricks through the windows of the Communist headquarters.

Some evidence of fraud on a large scale, perpetrated by the Communists, when the Soviet zone raided a house and found printing plates, ink and paper for printing 100,000 bills, with some in process. Two of the men involved in the counterfeiting were financial directors of the Communist Party.

When in December 1945 the Foreign Ministers in Moscow announced their trusteeship plan for Korea, all Korean parties, including Communists, protested. Suddenly, in the middle of meeting, the Communists changed. They favored trusteeship. There could be no deviating from the Moscow line.

Last year in Seoul, while the U. S. and Soviet commission met to discuss a provisional government for all Korea, the Russians said they wouldn't even listen to any Korean party that opposed trusteeship. Failing the American interpretation of the word "democratic" used by the Foreign Ministers, the Communists said: "We will exclude the Korean people from any stable group of Koreans."

For the Commission broke up. After a year-long stalemate, it has reconvened. The Russians are accepting a more liberal basis of discussion.

Meanwhile, Korea suffers spiritually and materially from the partition which puts nine million Koreans under an unwanted Red regime and separates the coal-producing, power-supplying north from the agricultural south. Daily about 1,000 Koreans slip across the boundary from the Soviet to the American zone. "Escape" is the word they use.



Ex-Senator Walsh Dead at 74

Boston — (NC) — Former U. S. Senator David I. Walsh, who has died here at the age of 74, became in 1913 the first person born of post-Revolutionary immigrant parents to become Governor of Massachusetts, and in 1919 the first Catholic of Irish descent to serve the State in the U. S. Senate.

Funeral services for Mr. Walsh were held at St. John's Church in nearby Clinton, Mass., where the legislator had been living for the past year.

Except for a two-year period in the '20s, Mr. Walsh held a Senate seat continuously from 1919 up to his defeat by Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., last year. He was born on November 11, 1872, in Leominster, Mass., the ninth of ten children of a factory laborer. He was orphaned at twelve, and sold papers and worked himself through Holy Cross College, where he was president and orator of the class of 1893 and subsequently through the Boston University law school, receiving his law degree in 1897.

At the age of 27 he began his political career as a member of the Massachusetts State Legislature from Clinton, Mass., where he had established a law practice. He ran for lieutenant governor in 1911, was defeated, ran again in 1913 and was elected, then became governor.

Bishop Replies To Criticism By Protestants Relief Plan For Foreign Students Set

Seranton, (NC) — Bishop William J. Haefy of Seranton, replying to two groups of Protestant clergymen who had assailed remarks he made in an address here, has advised them in a letter that their "bears are imaginary" that the Catholic Church is seeking tax funds for the maintenance and expansion of its parochial school system, but that they should not underestimate the value of their anti-Catholic utterances to the Communists.

The Bishop, who spoke at commencement exercises of Marywood College, was first the object of a strongly worded attack by the West Side Ministerium, a group of 18 ministers, who said that the Bishop's remarks were "unworthy of one in your position" and protested particularly against Bishop Haefy's statement that those who are engaged in attacking and misrepresenting the Catholic Church are unwitting tools of the Communists.

The second protest came from the Executive Committee of the United Churches of Lackawanna County, a larger Protestant unit, which said that Bishop Haefy's speech was part of "a deliberate and concerted campaign" on the part of Catholics to get tax funds for their schools, and took the occasion to "reaffirm our faith in the historic principle of separation of Church and State."

Second Protest

At the same time one local Protestant minister, the Rev. W. Aubrey Arlin of St. David's Episcopal Church, disavowed all connection with the statement of the West Side Ministerium, of which he is vice-president. He said he didn't have "time to be throwing stones at other denominations," and that while he disagreed with some of the Bishop's remarks, he agreed with others, and thought the Bishop had the right to express his views.

In his original address, Bishop Haefy said that the Supreme Court decision in the New Jersey school transportation case has led to a series of statements, widely published, that a national religious group is now being organized and that the Catholic Church must be publicized and castigated as seeking to undermine religious liberty in our nation.

"Not since 1928," he continued, "has the Catholic Church been so bitterly attacked and misrepresented as at this very time (unwittingly, yet very certainly, the spokesmen of various non-Catholic religious groups are falling into the trap set by Communist strategy to stir up a religious conflict as a prelude to the elimination of all religions and the establishment of a dictatorship in America patterned on the Kremlin and its 150,000,000 slaves."
