Father B. Daly Is Carmelite Head at Auburn

Auburn — Appointment of the Rev. Bernard Daly, O. Carm., as rector of Whitefriars here is announced this week by the Rev. Patrick William Russell, O. Carm., recently named Provincial of the New York Province of St. Elias Carmelite Fathers.

Father Daly who was ordained in Rome in 1933 was born in Stamford, Conn. He received his early education in St. Albert's Preparatory Seminary, Middle town, N. Y., the Carmelite House of Studies, Dublin, Ireland and the International College in Rome.

Post graduate work was done at the University of Notre Dame. Father Daly has been a teacher of physics and chemistry at St. Carmel High School, Los Angeles.

Whitefriars of which Father Daly will now be the superior succeeding Father Russell is located in the former Case mansion in South St. and is a novitiate for the Carmelite Fathers.

The monastery was formally dedicated by His Excellency Bishop Keane in September 1946 with leaders of the Whitefriars in attendance.

Ladies of Charity to Mark Patrons Feast on Saturday

Ladies of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul will celebrate the Feast of their patron and founder with a special Mass and corporate Communion at 7 o'clock on Saturday, July 19, at Our Lady of Lourdes Church.

A record attendance at this special Mass is expected although the obligation of the feastday may be fulfilled in any parish church.

Mountain Shrine to St. Joseph Nearly Ready

Prescott, Ariz. (NC) — The Shrine of St. Joseph of the Mountains, a statutory group located among the massive boulders of Yarnell Hill, a few miles south of here alongside the highway to Wickenburg, Ariz., is expected to be completed this summer.

The principal statue depicts St. Joseph with his carpenter tools at the base of this statue is an altar. Nearby is the partially executed scene of Christ at the Last Supper. Above is a replica of the Garden of Bethsemane containing a figure of the saintly Christ. A Way of the Cross marked by huge wooden crosses leads to a statue of the Crucifixion.

92 Boys Open Camp Villa Maria Season, Girls Session Listed for Aug. 6 Opening

Camp Villa Maria, Chemung County's only Catholic camp for boys and girls, will open its seventh season on Harris Hill on July 20 with a capacity enrollment of 92 boys.

Rev. Joseph L. Hagan, a member of the faculty of St. Andrew's Seminary, Rochester, and formerly assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church, Elmira, will be the Reverend Director of the camp after an absence of two years. Joseph Dalley will serve as Head Counselor assisted by a specially chosen group of seminarians and local young men as senior and junior counselors.

Daily activities for the campers will include baseball, handball, basketball, volleyball, track meets, hikes, swimming, and games in craft, nature, and swimming. Inter-cabin activities will furnish exciting competition each day and evening campfire program will close the days with songs and stories. Intensive pre-camp training for the entire staff was begun on July 14.

The religious welfare of the campers has not been overlooked. The Counselors who have charge of each cabin are seminarians. Each day begins with Mass and Holy Communion and closes with night prayers in the Big Hall. All the activities of each day are conducted in a Christian atmosphere by carefully selected leaders.

Miss Dorothy Keegan, of Rochester, will be director of the Girls' Camp Session which opens August 6. Five vacancies for this year are still open.

Faith in Belgium Firm Rochester Priest Finds

"Will I fly again? I should say I will. It is a beautiful and wonderful way to travel."

This is the reaction of Rochester's beloved Father Daniel Van der Meulen, pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church, who has been in Belgium for a three-month visit to Belgium. The 35-year-old priest has been in Belgium since June 1, and is returning to Rochester on Sunday, July 20, after a trip to Belgium, France, and Holland.

Interviewed at his rectory, Father Van der Meulen spoke enthusiastically of the Belgian Catholics he had discovered during his travels through Belgium. "I was really impressed with the enthusiastic religious spirit that prevails all over Belgium. Despite the hardships of the war, the Catholics here are as vigorous as I have ever seen. Everywhere I went their devotion was strong. I saw people going to Mass by the thousands and hundreds at huge crowds receiving Holy Communion on Sundays and even on week days."

"The Catholic soul in Belgium is amazingly strong and vital," Father Van der Meulen said. "The people here are very religious and the processions and religious festivals that are witnessed in May and June. In Ghent they held a procession to celebrate the 600th anniversary of St. Collette. Thousands of people marched in historical costumes. There was a huge pageant and masses of people describing the virtues of the saint and mysticism of her life."

Belgium is a country of many shrines. Near Father Van der Meulen's home in Brussels there is a nationally famous shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes. Built in 1878 the shrine has a replica of the real Lourdes grotto, outdoor Stations of the Cross and statues recalling the shrine mysticism of the Rosary.

In May alone more than 10,000 people visited the shrine. The greatest miracle ever recorded in Belgium is preserved in Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception.
