

Meeting With Madame Chiang Described by Rochester Nun

Sister Mary of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, the former Anna Wiliq of Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish and now a member of the community of the Sisters of Good Shepherd in Shanghai, China, has written to the Rochester Propagation of the Faith Office that her school was recently visited by Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the president of China.

Although not a Catholic, Madame Chiang has been friendly and helpful to the sisters and made a gracious impression upon the children of the school, Sister Mary wrote.

"She seemed very favorably impressed with the school, and expressed her gratitude for what we were doing for these poor Chinese girls. She was particularly interested in the children and spoke to them in a very motherly way. When she asked them why they were so happy (their faces were beaming), and little for answered: 'Because you are here.' She was greatly amused at the naive answer and took the children that they were happy because they had Jesus who were so well cared for."

Sister Mary, who is the daughter of John Wiliq of 334 Norton Street, Rochester, has been in China 13 years. She entered the Good Shepherd community in 1932 and went to Shanghai in 1933 with four other sisters to establish the first school of the Good Shepherd sisters in China.

She and the other sisters of the community were interned by the Japanese in a convent near Shanghai for more than two years.

The work of the Good Shepherd sisters in China is similar to that being done by the local community of sisters in Winston Road who are known as the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of Refuge.

Reich Catholics Win Britisher

London (NC) — Lord Pak enham, British Minister in charge of the British zones of Germany and Austria, has had a meeting of the Reich Catholics and Society here that was a Catholic himself he had been deeply impressed "by the splendid Catholic life of Germany."

He added "We must always remember that as individuals the Germans are infinitely dear to God, who is the Father of us all; we in this country must not forget that under the moral law we have a duty in justice to the vanquished."

It is believed that the splendid part played by the Church again at Hitler was no greater than the part played in these difficult days by the Church by Catholics, priests and laity. There is today in Germany a profound recognition of the social disease which was the result of the abandonment of Christian social principles.

"Germany has been ruled by wicked men, for whom now we can do nothing but offer our prayers, and there is no doubt that collectively Germans have sinned," Lord Parkenham said.

"We have a special duty to the Germans. They are our fellow human beings, each as dear to God as each of us, and we will be judged for good or ill on our treatment of them."
