O'Hara, Bishop of Buffalo, has invited Bishop Kearney to be the celebrant at the Solemn Holy Hour for men which will take place at 9 a. m. on Wednesday, September 24 in the Buffalo Civic Stadium. Bishop Kearney will also be the principal speaker at a meeting of the Missionary Union of the Clergy in the Hotel Statler Ballroom, Tuesday afternoon, September 23 and will preside at a sectional meeting of college students in the Hotel Lafayette on Wednesday afternoon, September 24.

Phi. Cardinals Due

The Diocese of Buffalo is making elaborate plans for the Eucharistic Congress which will commemorate the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Diocese. Five Cardinals, scores of bishops and priests and hundreds of thousands of Catholics from at least 15 states and Canada are expected to attend some of the events of the Congress. There will be outdoor Purified Masses in the Civic Stadium on all three days of the celebration. An Oriental Pontifical Mass in St. Joseph's Cathedral on Sept. 24 will interest many who have never participated in the liturgy of the Eastern Churches. Holy Hours for children, priests, women and men are scheduled for different periods during the Congress. There will be sectional meetings in the Hotel Statler and Lafayette for various professional groups and lay organizations.

The closing ceremony of the Congress will be a solemn Eucharistic procession through Delaware Park on Thursday, September 25. Observations in hotels or private dwellings may be secured by addressing the Congress Headquarters, Hotel Statler, Buffalo.

Diocesan Holy Name Plans Turnout for Boston Meeting

Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Societies will be represented with flying banners in the gigantic, all-day Holy Name parade in Boston Sunday, Oct. 6. The parade expected to have 100,000 Catholics in line, will begin at 10 a. m.

The National Holy Name Convention opens on Wednesday, Oct. 1, and will conclude with the parade. Final plans, bands and contingents are expected to pass the reviewing stand at 5 p. m.

Since, with a population of over three-quarters of a million, including one million Catholics, is expected to provide spectators in the millions, and hundreds of thousands of visitors will attend from all over the United States.

A National Convention Committee named by Lewis A. Schurz, president, Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, has inaugurated plans for having a delegation from each parish society.

New parish branches formed after the recent membership and expansion campaign, are particularly urged to communicate with this committee if they have not furnished details of their organization to the Holy Name Union secretary.

These societies will then be included on the mailing list to receive all details in connection with the convention delegations. The Transportation Committee chairman will shortly announce the best available facilities for convention travel.
