Our Lady of Perpetual Help Post: Memorial Mass on Sunday, Aug. 17 at 8:30 a. m.

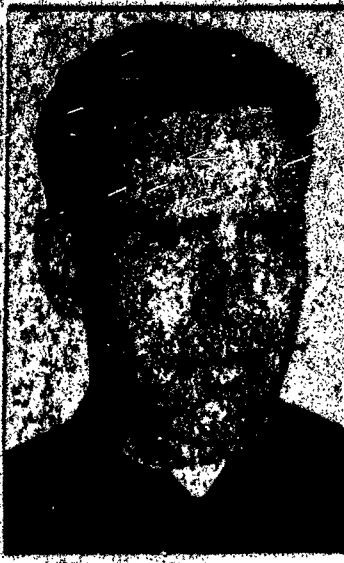
Speedy Heart Post: Memorial Mass on V-J day and participation in services at St. Augustine's Post.

Diocesan Holy Name Plans Turnout for Boston Meeting

Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Societies will be represented with flying banners in the gigantic, all-day Holy Name parade in Boston, Sunday, Oct. 5. The parade expected to have 100,000 Catholic men in line, will begin at 10 a. m.

The National Holy Name Convention opens on Wednesday, Oct. 1 and will conclude with the parade. Final hosts, bands and contingents are expected to pass the reviewing stand at 5 p. m.

Boston, with a population of two and three-quarter millions including one million Catholics is expected to provide spectators in the millions, and hundreds of thousands of visitors will attend from all over the United States.

Committee Plans
A National Conventions Committee named by Lewis A. Schub, president, Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, has inaugurated plans for having a delegation from each parish society.

New parish branches formed after the recent membership and organization campaign, are particularly urged to communicate with this committee if they have not furnished details of their organization to the Holy Name Union secretary.

These societies will then be included on the mailing list to receive all details in connection with the convention delegations.

The Transportation Committee chairman will shortly announce the best available facilities for convention travel.

Persons preferring to drive to Boston may make arrangements within their own delegations for the proper number of cars, departure time, route to be followed, stops to be made, division of the expense, etc. If additional space is available or needed this can be cleared with the Transportation Committee chairman.

The chairman should also be sure the number of persons traveling by auto so that a caravan can be arranged if possible, permitting the various groups to travel together.

The National Holy Name Convention, first held since 1936, is called at the invitation of His Excellency the Most Reverend Richard J. Cushing, Archbishop of Boston. Previous national conventions were held in Baltimore in 1911, Washington in 1924 and New York in 1936.

That last convention was referred to as "the greatest demonstration of faith ever witnessed" and the national headquarters say that this year's convention is being undertaken "on a scale not even dreamed of, let alone approached, in the past."

As a mass appeal to piety, it will be of all considerations, political and otherwise, "the spiritual exercises incident to the convention, with many, many thousands of Catholic men participating, will defy all material precedent."

In an age which has seen centuries-old hostility toward the Catholic Church and suspicion of its motives, supplanted and surpassed by a tidal wave of Godlessness which has taken political form to engulf a large part of the world, they will stand out above everything else as a living reminder to all peoples that eternal salvation lies, not in Moscow or man-made Utopias, but in the Mind and Heart of God, through reverence and respect for His Divine Son.

This Rochester Diocesan Convention Committee is headed by James V. Taylor, 30 Chestnut St., who will be assisted by Frank R. Davis, 292 Lakeview Pl., secretary; Arthur E. Welch, 35 Fur long Rd., in charge of all transportation matters; and James F. Osterman, 100 Jersey St., to be in charge of the delegation en route to the convention.

The Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, Diocesan Spiritual Director, expects to lead the delegation from this diocese and it is hoped that no parish spiritual director may be company their delegations.

Deputy chairmen have been appointed as follows: Auburn, John F. Brennan; Corning, William Cassidy; Geneva, Louis McGulgan; Elmira, Cornelius J. Milliken.

Descriptive folders giving many details of the convention have been mailed to the president of each parish society and he will have full charge of the arrangements for his parish.

Parish delegations will make their own hotel reservations directly with the Housing Committee-National Convention, Holy Name Society, 9 Whitmore St., Boston 11, Mass. This housing committee has made a survey of available rooms in the homes of delegates whose hotel facilities have been exhausted. Requests for rooms should be sent in no later than Sept. 2nd.

While the convention opens on Wednesday, Oct. 1, and concludes with the parade on Sunday, Oct. 5, not all men may find it possible to be present for all of that time. Some of the delegations will plan to attend all sessions; others will arrive for the Friday evening Candle Light Holy Hour services; others may not arrive until Saturday morning.
