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### Holy Name Rally Expects 65,000

New York—(NC)—Prayers for world unity will be offered at the fifth annual Holy Name religious service which will be held on September 28 in the Polo Grounds, here, and at which His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, will preside and deliver the principal address.

### Hungarian Bishops Protest State's Policy on Germans

Budapest—(NC)—The Bishops of Hungary have made new protests to the government against the indiscriminate expulsion, under a policy of collective responsibility, of Germans long domiciled in Hungary.

In a letter to Prime Minister Dinnyes the Bishops recall that in 1944, they did everything in their power, through protests to the then existing government, to prevent the inhuman deportation of Jews. "Now we consider it necessary," they add, "in full recognition of our Divine mandate, to protest against the deportation of Germans, especially since they are also Catholics."

The Bishops point out that in previous protests they had emphasized the difficulty of preventing "the inhuman expulsion of our Hungarian brothers from Czechoslovakia when we also expelled our German subjects."

### Chicago Bears Aid St. Joe's College

Indianapolis, Ind. (NC)—The Chicago Bears of the National Professional Football League will play an intersquad exhibition game here Sunday, August 31, as a benefit for St. Joseph's College at nearby Connersville, where the Bears are training for the fourth consecutive summer.

Proceeds of the game, which is being sponsored by the local Rotary Club, will help pay for furnishings in the nearly complete government recreation building on St. Joseph's College grounds. Since August 1st the Bears have been pounding the turf on the north campus of the school. According to owner-coach George Hinia, "we like more things about Connersville than the football field, the classrooms and the fieldhouse."

### James Sheedy Rites Held in Corning

Corning—James H. Sheedy, 65, died at the Corning Hospital Friday, Aug. 22. He was born in Corning, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Sheedy. He was married to Margaret Kelley of Corning. Mrs. Sheedy died in February, 1943.

Mr. Sheedy was a member of St. Patrick's Church and the Holy Name Society. Survivors include two brothers, Dennis J. Sheedy of Corning and Patrick Sheedy of New Bedford, Mass.; three sisters, Miss Margaret Sheedy, Miss Della Sheedy and Mrs. Thomas Madigan, all of Corning.

Funeral services were held from the home of his sisters at 136 Columbia St., Monday at 8:30 a. m. and at 9 o'clock in St. Patrick's Church. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.

### State Convention Affirms Parochial School Bus Act

New Brunswick, N. J. (RNS)—By a vote of 50 to 28, the Constitutional Convention agreed to insert in New Jersey's proposed new state charter a provision that public funds may be used for the transportation of children to all schools, public or private. The convention thus affirmed the state's parochial school bus act, which was upheld last February by the U. S. Supreme Court in a five-to-four decision.

The school bus issue arose over an amendment by Mrs. Marion Constantine, of Passaic, calling upon the convention to strike out a proposal by Judge John J. Rafferty, of Middlesex, for a permissive clause broad enough to protect the school bus statute from possible attack on the ground that it is limited to schools not operated for profit.

Mrs. Constantine contended that the issue was entirely legislative and that inclusion of the bus provision in the tax article of the constitution would cause the charter to be judged on sectarian lines when it is submitted to referendum next November. She was supported by Wayne D. McMurray, of Monmouth, who said the bus proposal is an "emotional issue that splits people into opposing camps and may revive old conflicts we all hoped had been laid to rest."

### Iron Curtain Bars S. H. Messenger

New York—An Iron Curtain of censorship has been clamped down on "The Messenger of the Sacred Heart" in nine countries. They are: Albania, Bohemia, Rumania, Yugoslavia, Croatia, Latvia, Lithuania and Poland. Fifty editions continue to be published in other parts of the world.

Four editions of the magazine are published in the U. S. One in English, reaches more than 300,000 Catholic families. The others in the U. S. are published in German, Polish and Ukrainian. Three are published in Canada—one in English, one in French and one in Indian, "Kitchitaw Miteh." Nine are published in India, two in France and Ireland (one in English and one in Gaelic).

Take Mission Course Burgos, Spain—(NC)—A course in missionology which attracted seminararians from all over Spain and a group of Latin American students from the Seminary of Comillas, has just been completed here under the direction of Archbishop Lucian Perez Platero of Burgos. A message received from the Vatican Secretariate of State imparted the Apostolic Blessing to the students.

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### CIO Steelworkers Denounce Communies

Pueblo, Colo.—(NC)—A resolution denouncing efforts of the Communist Party to interfere in the affairs of the Congress of Industrial Organizations was adopted here at the annual conference of District 38 of the C. I. O.'s United Steelworkers of America, representing 45,000 workers in the western states. The resolution also stated "the Congress of Industrial Organizations is an American institution, dedicated to the attainment of its well-defined social and economic objectives within the framework of American political democracy. The C. I. O., as an American organization, has no interest apart from the interests of our people and our country."

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
