The chief of the "peculiar characters" is Nick, "manager and impresario with the morals of a pirate shark," a ruthless crook who cheated and robbed and strongarmed his way to the big money" Also there are "lesser managers, flunkeys and promoters, as contemptible a lot of burns and gangaters as over cut themselves in on the earnings of promising athletes and then stabbed them in the back when they had reached their inevitable end as punch-drunk wrecks

Eddle, who "went to Princeton for two years and who kidded himself that he could write a play about prize figthing," got "really to like the life, the constant drinking, the sweat and stench and excitement of (the training) gym. the loui talk and cheap conniving, the fixed fights and easy money" The story is written in the first person by Eddle, and, says the reviewer, "he paints a vivid portrait gallery of the faces and habits and exterior characteris tics of a dozen abominable persons." There is "bottomiesa vulgarity, revolting debauchery, deliberate, cold-blooded cruelty, lying, cheating, stealing." As for the fighters, "hundreds of them, ambitious boys with athletic bodies who thought they could win fame and fortune in the ring, ended up with the d.t.'s and parents instead."



TUESDAY, Sept. 16-88. Cornelius and Cyprian martyrs. St. Cornelius, a Roman, succeeded St. Fabian as Pope during the Decian persecution in 250. He was banished to Civita Vecchia, where he eventually suffered martyrdom. St. Cyprian was an African of noble birth, who led an evil life in his youth but in middle life was converted to Christianity, entered the priesthood and became Bishop of Carthage. He was beheaded in 258.


