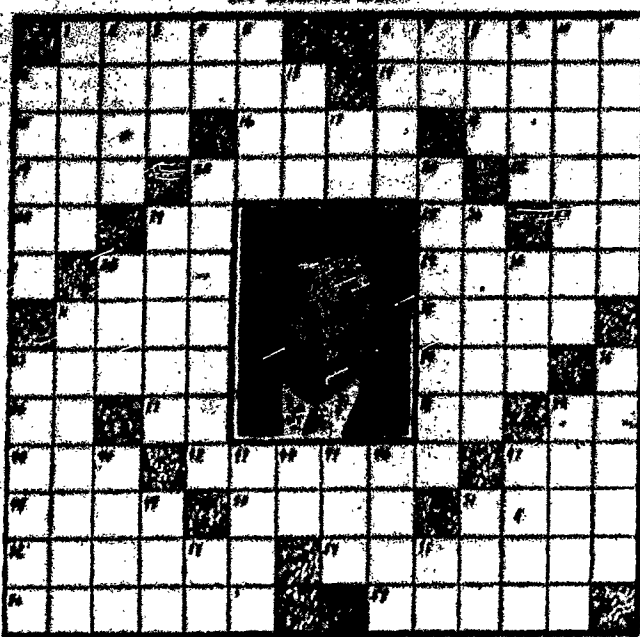

## Clothing from U. S. Catholics Comforts Grateful Yugoslavs

(From Yugoslavia, where Archbishop Aloysius Stepinac of Zagreb has been imprisoned and where complaints of persecution of the Catholic Church mount steadily, comes this story from the representative of War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference—an evidence of the transcendence of Catholic charity.)

Belgrade, Yugoslavia—(NC)—After Mass and a hasty cup of coffee, we start out at seven o'clock through a driving rain. Our first destination is Belgrade, a village, some 30 kilometers from Zagreb, where we are to distribute clothing to the needy of your village. We wish it could be more. With it comes the deepest feeling of warm friendship for the people. A Catholic priest from America has been sent by the bishops to see that the needy among you receive something. We hope you will be patient while it is being distributed. May God and Our Blessed Mother love every one of you.

Caps and Shoes  
One after the other villagers receive their garment, but linger on. It is refreshing to note how much joy one small garment can give to a person. Perhaps only a cap, a pair of men's shoes to a woman, a baby's bonnet to a young mother, a shirt, a dress, some underwear, socks to children. Here is a weatherbeaten old woman, toothless and wrinkled, who gaily puts on her new winter coat for the admiration of the neighbors. Here is a little five-year-old boy who has never had a pair of trousers of his own now trying on his brother's too over those he has just received. Grizzled old Tom huddling off with his heavy overcoat as though someone might change his mind but pausing just long enough to say gratefully "This is a fine coat. I can keep warm next winter watching my back." Ranka, clinging tightly to her grandmother's hand as the grandmother explains, "She is all I have in the world and I am all she has. Her father was killed in battle her mother died of typhoid. I don't know what we'd do if anything happened to either of us. And the estate look on Ranka's face, matched only by that on the face of the grandmother, when Ranka received a bright red dress.

Our cavalcade is welcomed by the mayor. Yugoslav Red Cross officials introduce the War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference representative, who replies, Through his interpreter, he tells the people "The Catholic bishops, priests, and people of the United States are very happy to send this clothing to the needy of your village."

## Why Charity? Mr. Brown, an Individual With Dignity, Given Aid

Mr. Brown twirled his hat in his hands, looked down at the floor, cleared his throat and hesitatingly said, "Now, look—I need some help, but I don't want to be caseworked."

Like Jimmy's statement, last week that he did not want charity, this too, was familiar to the caseworker. The term casework is perhaps as much abused and misunderstood as is charity. Mr. Brown needed help. He, like each of us, was an individual. G. Montgomery had come to a social agency for help. The way or method by which the workers in a social agency attempt to help an individual to help himself is called casework.

"When I was a boy," a man said recently, "we believed in charity. My mother always baked extra bread and an extra pair of beans for a poor widow in the neighborhood. Now, I suppose, you'd tell her to go to an agency for casework."

Perhaps we would. We believe in charity in its true sense. We would say that the widow in question deserved help, given to her in accordance with her own individual needs, in a way which would not damage her self-respect, nor her dignity as a human being. We strongly suspect that the widow would prefer to work out a plan to help herself with the assistance of a caseworker, rather than being dependent upon the occasional generosity of her neighbors, no matter how well intended.

Help given on an individual basis, with recognition of the worth and dignity of the person—there was a time in our history (not too long ago) when help of that kind was virtually impossible to obtain.

Prior to the sixteenth century Europe and the western world was Catholic. The Catholic concept of charity, of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man, of the inherent dignity of the individual as a human being, created in the image and likeness of God, was accepted by all. There were people in economic need; they were children of God, and brothers of all in the Church. For their care, the Bishops and the religious orders took responsibility. There were those who faced problems, much the same as people face today. For them, the Church provided counsel and guidance. Help was given in the spirit of charity.

Following the dissolution of the monasteries and the seizure of their property by the State, those in need were left without a source of help. Worse still, the belief that the successful and well-to-do were the elect of God, and that those in need were in disfavor with God led to the conclusion that the poor were poor as punishment by God, and had brought their lot on themselves. Soon the spirit of charity as a menace, and harsh restrictive laws were passed. To be in economic need was regarded almost as criminal, those in need had no rights, and should be treated as their "betters" chose to treat them.

This attitude was prevalent when America was settled. The Colonists brought with them the Elizabethan concept of law. The lot of the person in need in our
