





O'Brien, Lawrence Sanson, and Alfredo Morotti. Prayers at the grave were said by Fathers Ryan, Neagle and Alleto.

Mr. Sigler was right-of-way superintendent for the New York Telephone Corporation and after its consolidation with the Rochester Telephone Company in 1921, he became right-of-way superintendent for the newly formed Rochester Telephone Corporation. He spent a total of 37 years working for both companies until his retirement in 1936. After his retirement, Mr. Sigler served as contact man for the Cabot Gas Corporation of Boston, New York, when they laid their natural gas line through Rochester and vicinity.

Mr. Sigler was a member of the Genesee Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers of America and the Liederkranz Club. He leaves two daughters, Veronica M. and Marcella L., a brother, Eugene F., and a sister, Bessie J. Sigler all of Rochester.
