

Faith as Basis for Boy Scout Training Told at Diocesan Rally

"If you are faithful in your duties to your Church, you have no fear of your fidelity to the Boy Scouts," His Excellency, Bishop Kearney told more than 500 Boy Scouts from various sections of the diocese in a rally Sunday, sponsored by the Catholic Lay Committee on Scouting.

The rally held at Edgerton Park demonstrated the progress made in Catholic Scouting by the Bishops' Committee since organized in February. Seven new units were inducted by the Bishop who also presented Ad Altare Dei crosses to 23 Scouts.

The Bishop in explaining why the Catholic program of Scouting had been launched recalled the letter of Commander Shea, his son during the war. "You are a Catholic," he said, "and you are a good Catholic, because if you are a good Catholic, you are a good American."

Bishop Kearney told the boys if they are good Catholics they'll be good Boy Scouts.

STATEMENTS OF the world were called upon to consider the recent World Boy Scout Jam in France by the Rev. Frederick P. Gehring, C.M., chaplain of the Navy and known as "The Guadalcanal Padre" for exploits in the Pacific fighting.

"Why can't statesmen take lessons from these Boy Scouts of the world who were not ashamed to bring God into their assemblies?" Father Gehring asked.

The priest who was "Father" to boys of all creeds in the Pacific told of the example given by boys of strong Catholic faith on the battlefield.

If you live up to your Catholic faith, you'll do the right thing, he told the Scouts.

The ceremony held in front of the Edgerton Park Grandstand and attended by many parents and friends was climaxed with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Bishop Kearney officiating. The Rev. Dr. William Byrnes of Ithaca was deacon and the Rev. George Schmitt, subdeacon. The Rev. Dr. John E. Maney was master of ceremonies. About 20 pastors and assistant pastors were on the stage.

Opening the program was a procession of scouts with Richard I. Toole, master of ceremonies. Music was furnished by massed parochial school bands directed by Frank H. Melville.

Since the daily Rosary may be made a condition for gaining the Sabbatine Privilege, the Scapular Apostolate has united with the Apostolate of Our Lady of Fatima in a great crusade to ward off a third World War.

Mail Deadlines Set For Men Overseas

Parcels for delivery in Japan, Korea, and the islands in the Pacific should be mailed as early as possible during the period stated, not later than Nov. 1. It is suggested that parcels for Navy and Marine Corps serving in most remote areas be mailed not later than Oct. 15.

Lake Church to Erect New Altar, Improvements Set

A new High Altar, designed to meet modern rubrical requirements, will be erected at Holy Cross Church, Lake Avenue, within the next few months. The altar will serve as a permanent memorial to the late Father Alexander J. McCabe, pastor of Holy Cross for 31 years and will be given by the people of the parish. William J. Wozniak and Anna Wozniak have contacted the architect.

Since Jan. 1 many improvements have been made to the church interior and exterior. A new heating plant has been installed by Hart and Goodman Co., comprising an H. D. Smith water tube boiler with oil burner attached. New converter type radiators have been installed throughout the nave of the church.

G. Gleason Co., Rochester, has erected a beautiful new altar entrance designed to harmonize with the architecture of the church.

THIS ENTRANCE, opened for public use Sept. 21, will serve parishioners who use the parking station in the rear of the church and serve also as an emergency exit. It is constructed of medium stone. S. Pirostone and E. M. Lorschneider acted as architects for this project and the heating plant.

During the summer months, Thales Company of New York City, restored the church interior, painting the walls, ceiling and woodwork and restoring the sanctuary decoration and the Stations of the Cross. This work has done much to brighten the interior of the church.

A new lighting system, designed and installed by Earl Driscoll, has enhanced the beauty of the church. Center and side wall fixtures have been removed and concealed fixtures installed. Remodeling of the side altar and statue pedestals together with a complete remodeling of sanctuary cabinets was done by Timothy O'Brien. The painting of the side altar, the baptistry and the new entrance interior is the work of Eric Kitchner.

Funds for all these projects, which cost approximately \$25,000, will be raised by the people of Holy Cross by the end of this year.

Support School Safety Campaign

Cooperation of every Rochester citizen is being urged by the Rochester Safety Council in its "Back to School Safety Campaign" during the month of September.

Using "Give the kids a brake" for its campaign slogan, the council is making a drive to enlist the public in preventing accidents to children.

A total of 107 children under 15 years of age were injured in traffic accidents in Rochester during the first seven months of 1939. Edwin J. Smith, Safety Council director, points out:

The campaign appeals to adults on two separate premises: (1) that they do all in their power to prevent accidents to their own children and (2) that they drive their own automobile with caution to prevent accidents to other people's children.
