Bishop to Bless Fatima Shrine at Pro-Cathedral

An outdoor shrine in honor of Our Lady of the Rosary of Fatima will be dedicated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney on the lawn of Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral, Saturday, Oct. 18, at 10:30 p. m. according to the Rt. Rev. Magr. George V. Burns.

The shrine is to be dedicated in memory of the boys of Sacred Heart parish who gave their lives in World War II and is sponsored by Catholic War Veterans Post No. 1127 of Sacred Heart parish.

An outdoor altar bearing the statue of Our Lady of the Rosary of Fatima by DePisto will have an oak frame in front with the dedication inscription covered by glass. The Rev. Edward J. McAniff, assistant pastor, in charge of the shrine said this week.

In back of the statue and altar will be a grotto background.

Dedication of the shrine is a feature of the first Novena in honor of Our Lady's apparitions at Fatima which will be conducted in Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral from Oct. 13 to Oct. 21 inclusive.

The Novena is in answer to the requests of Our Lady to the children.

Way to Mental Peace Stressed By Msgr. Sheen

The way to find mental peace is not through passive abandonment of the body to the desires of human flesh as Freudian psychology advises, but rather through active abandonment of body and soul to God.

This antidote for modern neurotic conditions was advanced by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen in his address to a Christian Culture Lecture audience at Aquinas auditorium, Friday. Monsignor Sheen declared that many psychological problems are caused by an overpowering sense of guilt for personal sin. The increasing consumption of drugs and liquor, he said, attests the fact that many people today are unable to live with "their own personalities."

DENOUNCING THE methods and philosophy of Freudian psychoanalysis, the distinguished speaker expressed his conviction that such men cannot cure this type of psychosis because they deny guilt and sin.

In a comparison of the philosophies of Karl Marx and Sigmund Freud, he explained that the founder of Communism was wrong because he denied God and that his psychological counterpart erred in denying Christ. "Marx was right in his desire to bring men to brotherhood, but he failed to establish brotherhood because he forgot the fatherhood of God," he averred. "Freud was looking for peace of mind," he added, "but he also failed because he forgot the redemption of Christ, when the sins of men were conquered for all time."

IN HIS DISCUSSION on Freud, Msgr. Sheen explained that he did not condemn all psychoanalysts, nor yet the "perfectly valid" science of psychiatry. He discredited the psychoanalysis of Freudian followers, whom he accused of interpreting every dream as "an unfulfilled sex libido." Overemphasis on sex has corrupted that school of psychology, he said.

Church's Diamond Jubilee in Moravia

Moravia — St. Patrick's Church will celebrate its diamond jubilee on Sunday, Oct. 19, when His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney, will sing a Solemn Jubilee Mass and preside at the anniversary service at 10:30 a. m. Following the Mass, the Bishop will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to a group of 60 members of the parish.

The Rev. Francis C. Waterstraat, pastor of St. Patrick's since April 9, 1946, when he returned to the Diocese from 4 years of service as Chaplain in the Army, has invited all present and former parishioners and friends of the parish to share in the celebration of the 75th anniversary.

ONE OF ST. PATRICK'S proudest claims to fame is that its first resident pastor in 1858 was a young priest, the Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, who 21 years later was to become the second Bishop of Rochester. Father Hickey was the pastor of St. Patrick's for 7 years. As Archbishop Hickey he returned in 1922 to play the leading role in the 50th anniversary of the founding of the parish.

The parish of St. Patrick's was founded in 1873 but prior to that year priests from Auburn and the Rev. Archangelo Paganini from Selpio had celebrated Mass and administered the Sacraments in private homes in the community. The cornerstone of the present church was laid in 1884 under the direction of the Rev. Hugh J. Rafferty, pastor of Selpio, and the building was completed in 1890.

The Pre-Cana Conference is open to all Catholics who are recently engaged or recently married. "It seeks," the D.C.C.W. spokesman says, "to replace the secularist attitude toward marriage and the family which many couples can easily fall into, with a more Christian outlook by an educational process."

"Thus it is hoped that the root cause of much modern marital friction will be stunted and the obstacles to even greater happiness be overcome. The true end and purpose of such a course was well epitomized by his Holiness Pope Pius XI in his Encyclical on Christian Marriage when he wrote, 'Let then, those who are about to enter on married life, approach that state well disposed and well prepared, so that they will be able, as far as they can, to help each other in sustaining the vicissitudes of life, and yet more in attending to their eternal salvation and in forming the inner man into the fullness of the age of Christ.'"

Recently in an Eastern diocese the question was asked of about 100 couples as to whether they thought the average Catholic was well prepared at the time of marriage. Only eight per cent of the husbands and wives answered in the affirmative. This group, all experienced in Cane work, were practically unanimous in stating that the Cane program does offer couples positive help.
