Heroes of Dieppe Recalled in Mass

Montreal (NC) — The Rev. Armand Sabourin, heroic chaplain who accompanied the Fusiliers de Mont Royal when they stormed the beaches of Dieppe, officiated at a Mass offered here in the presence of the Fusiliers to mark the fifth anniversary of the Dieppe attack, the forerunner of the successful invasion of the continent.

Father Sabourin, who went about under enemy fire consoling and helping the wounded and dying, recalls that but a small number of the 800 Fusiliers who had taken part in the attack, succeeded in returning to their base in Britain.

The lesson of Dieppe, Father Sabourin told the veterans attending the Memorial Mass, was that the men who had taken part "taught us not only how to live but also how to die." To live was not merely to eat and drink, but to have the courage of fighting for and upholding the true ideals of life, he said. The troops had known the grim physical demands of army life, he continued, but had done everything with a smile on their lips, and a Christian eagerness to accept the will of God at all times.

"Our troops knew where to draw their strength; you would see them on the occasion of the various religious Feast Days going to Confession and Holy Communion. They had their real faith, but I knew their real worth, these men facing hardship and suffering. They lived their lives sincerely, and we must imitate their example in the battle of our daily lives," he said.

Father Sabourin also declared that the troops had known how to die. They had made their peace with their Creator the very eve of the assault on Dieppe. That night they had accepted the possible sacrifice of their lives, and they did so with a smile because they were strong in the strength of God.

Work on \$160,548 School To Begin at St. Anthony's

Work on a new \$160,548 structure to replace fire-destroyed St. Anthony's School will begin soon it was announced following awarding of the contract to the Mitchell Brothers Contracting Co.

Rev. Albert L. Simonetti, pastor of St. Anthony's, made the announcement, explaining that the contract was for general construction work and does not include plumbing, heating, electrical wiring or furnishings. Construction will begin probably before the end of October, he stated.

Total cost of the new school will be "close to \$200,000," the pastor pointed out. This will be the first building of the parish's \$400,000 rebuilding project to replace the church and school destroyed in the fire of last February.

A TEMPORARY CHAPEL to serve the needs of the parish until the church is erected will be set up in the school building basement. It will accommodate 430 persons. This will be transformed eventually into an assembly hall.

The building will be of limestone faced red brick and will occupy the site of the burned-out church, facing W. Washington Avenue. It will be completely fireproof. An innovation will be the use of glass chalkboards in place of the black slate boards previously used.

Design for the new school was worked out by Leo E. Conside to meet the rigid standards of the New York State Department of Education. Floor plan provides for eight classrooms with offices for supervisors and teachers. It will also include offices for a nurse and doctor.

On the second floor a 22x44 audio visual and music room is planned. Furnishings will take advantage of recent visual aids developed for teaching.

Transactions leading to the building contract were carried on in the presence of Father Simonetti and the Very Rev. William J. Brien, head of the Elmira Deanery, who represented the Diocese of Rochester by appointment of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney.

Also attending were John L. Cavaluzzi, Adolph A. Cirulli, church trustees, Anthony J. Morcell and Joseph P. Carozza, church auditors, Francis T. McGros, chairman of the building fund campaign, Atty. Anthony B. Cleri, Leo E. Conside of the architectural firm, and representatives of the press were also present.
