24 Monsignori to be Invested by Bishop In Rites at Pro-Cathedral November 17

Twenty-four diocesan priests, newly honored by Pope Pius XII, will be invested with the robes of monsignorship November 17 at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in special ceremonies at which His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will preside.

The Supreme Pontiff, as announced Friday, has honored the Diocese of Rochester by naming three Protentary Apostolics, eighteen domestic prelates with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor, and three papal chamberlains with the title of Very Reverend Monsignor.

The investiture rite will take place on the tenth anniversary of the installation of Bishop Kearney.

Named Protentary Apostolic, highest rank of monsignorship in the Church, are three Rochester churchmen who already enjoy the dignity of domestic prelate:

The Fall of Europe
If U. S. Goes Hungry?
Go to the Workers

It's easy to denounce Communism on a well-fed stomach, as we do here in America, but after dinner oratory is a very weak weapon against the Red Octopus which already has engulfed almost most of all of Europe, most of Asia, and even now flings its fierce tentacles towards our own shores.

AT THE MOMENT, there is real danger that France and Italy may come completely under the sway of the Red banner. Such a disaster, if it happens, spells the end of Europe. The prospect is appalling but let us face some facts. Much, if not most, of the success of the Soviet conquest in Europe can be attributed to the force of arms, intrigue and conspiracy. But this is not the whole story of Soviet success.

How can we explain, for example, the prestige of the prestige of strong Communist organizations in the traditionally Catholic countries of Europe? How can we explain the amazing vote-getting power of the Communists in such nations as France and Italy, even the city of Rome itself? Why is it that so many Europeans, nurtured in the very cradle of Christian Europe offer such little resistance to Communist enticement?

COURTS BAN SCHOOL BUSES

Des Moines — (NC) — Public school buses in Iowa may not carry private and parochial school children, the Iowa State Supreme Court has ruled here. In an unanimous decision, which will effect thousands of Catholic school pupils, the court stressed it was interpreting state laws and that no constitutional issue was involved.

The action sustained a district court's ruling in a case brought by the Silver Lake Consolidated School District, Palo Alto County. The district had requested declaratory judgment as to whether they could continue to pick up parochial school pupils in their buses without jeopardizing their right to enter into a \$2,000,000 transportation assistance program passed by the Iowa legislature in 1946. To qualify for this aid, school districts were required to comply with all state regulations.

Diocese Sets Mission Sunday Observance

Mission Sunday will be celebrated this Sunday (Oct. 19) in all churches of the Rochester Diocese.

Special observance of the world mission cause will take place at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart where Solemn High Mass will be offered at 11 o'clock.

Officers of the Mass will be moderators of Crusade Mission Units of the city. The Rt. Rev. Magr. Edward J. Byrne of St. Bernard's Seminary, will be celebrant, assisted by the Rev. John Calahan, chaplain of Our Lady of Mercy High School, as deacon, and the Rev. Thomas Berman of St. Andrew's Seminary, as sub-deacon. With the Rt. Rev. Magr. Edward M. Lyons as master of ceremonies, students of St. Andrew's Seminary will act as minor officers. Students from Nazareth College, Aquinas Institute, St. Mary's School of Nursing, Our Lady of Mercy High School, Nazareth Academy, St. Agnes Institute, St. Joseph's and St. Mary's Commercial Schools, Academy of the Sacred Heart will be in attendance. The Cathedral Choir under the direction of Mr. Raymond Hasenauer will chant the Mass.

Prayer for the occasion will be from the Rev. Clarence C. McIntyre, O.M.I. of Buffalo. The Oblates of Mary Immaculate to which mission society Father McIntyre is affiliated are usually associated with the Eskimo. They have all the missions of the Northwest, the Arctic regions extending to the North Pole.

ASK SUPPORT FOR FOOD PLAN

Cincinnati — (NC) — "Every good human instinct tells us that we simply cannot ignore" the misery of starving millions in war-torn lands and "our sense of Christian charity allows us no alternative" but to cooperate wholeheartedly with President Truman's voluntary food saving program, Archbishop John J. McNicholas, O.P., Archbishop of Cincinnati, declared in a statement issued here.

The Archbishop, who is chairman of the Administrative Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, addressed his statement to the nation as a whole and to Catholics in particular. Archbishop McNicholas stated that their only hope of assistance and even of survival lies in our willingness to make some sacrifices to conserve food in order that they may live.

Pope Exhorts U.S. Youth To Remedy World Evils

Vatican City — (NC) — His Holiness Pope Pius XII, in a discourse broadcast by short wave to the convention of the National Conference of Catholic Charities and the St. Vincent de Paul Society in New Orleans, directed a particular appeal to America's Catholic youth to become "fellow workers" for the truth by joining the apostolate of Christian charity.

"Such an apostolate," the Pope said, "would revitalize their faith, give direction and stability to a correct attitude toward the various things of life and awaken the powers of leadership, the while it would help powerfully to remedy the evils of social and racial inequalities."
