Students Talk Leader Training At Nazareth

First Student-Faculty Conference held this week at Nazareth College centered on the theme, "Learn to Live," and discussed training for new officers of the Undergraduate Association and heads of campus organizations.

All faculty members and all officers of student organizations were invited to participate in the discussion, which followed talks by the officers of the Undergraduate Association.

The president, Elaine Kolesnik, presided and opened the meeting with remarks on the responsibility of an officer to her school and to her organization.

"A student office is not just an honor but a trust," declared Miss Kolesnik in urging those present to use their leadership in the proper way and thus to improve school spirit.

MARY ELEN TRESMOTT of East Rochester, the vice-president, spoke on leadership and the qualities of a good leader. "The mark of a leader," stated Miss Trescott, "is not to do all the work herself but to get others to work with her."

Norma I. DePrez, secretary, chose as the theme of her talk the primary work of the student to get an integrated education. Summarizing her topic, she quoted from Father Leen's "What is Education." "To the Christian student, education is that culture of mind, the will and the emotions, which, whilst adapting a man for the exercise of a particular calling, disposes him to achieve an excellent personal and social life within the framework of that calling."

The talk by Betty LaRue of Utica, president of the Sophomore Class, on extra-curricular life in the college stressed the part played by such activities in a well-rounded education.

"If the students are to live what they learn, they must be shown how their studies can be applied to their lives. Clubs and extra-curricular activities can be instrumental in accomplishing this, that is, if they are used as they should be, to supplement the classroom, not to supplant it."

Faculty members responded to student questions and commended the Undergraduate Association on its planning for the year's activities. The Reverend Edward Lintz, head of the Philosophy Department, commented on the fact that students probably will not realize the importance and value of many of the subjects they are now studying until long after they have left college. He pointed out that such subjects as mathematics and philosophy, for example, have been included in the cur-
