Safety Stressed At School Meet

Safety was stressed in St. Patrick's School, Elmira, when ten of the eighth grade pupils were sworn in as patrol boys and girls. With the Rev. William J. Gaynor presiding, four speakers were presented.

All Weacott, Elmira representative of the American Automobile Association, spoke of the value of obedience to safety rules. Joseph Balok of the Junior Association of Commerce and Charming County Safety Council emphasized that safety in the home and on the street is just as essential as in school. He presented the badges and cards to the patrol members.
