Russia's Curtain Hides Discord Priest Tells R. C.
 Russia has set up its Iron Curtain to keep the world from knowing the discord within and not to protect military secrets, the Rev. Waldimir B. Dowhovitch, pastor of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Church said Monday night.

He spoke at Columbus Center to a discussion group studying Communism and its growth.

The speaker said that Russia consists of a number of culturally independent groups, each having its own language, customs and traditions.

He explained that these independent groups, over a period of several hundred years, had been dominated by the single state of Muscovy.

The Marxian theory, he said, was readily acceptable to the Muscovites because their economy had always operated on a communal basis.

THOSE PROVINCES of Russia bordering on Europe, the pastor said, have always had the same conception of private property and ownership which characterizes European countries and the United States.

Father Dowhovitch said that in these provinces an underground army of 450,000 men is in operation.

The speaker said the Communists can best be defeated through the encouragement of a belief in God in the individual. He said that faith in God and atheistic Communism are incompatible.

He insisted that it should be brought home to American labor leaders that the realization of the Marxian ideal in Russia had resulted in conditions of slavery for Russian workers.

Atty. James L. Kerwan will preside at the discussion group's next session on Nov. 3.

 Hornell—Dr. J. Raymond Kelly of Hornell was among 800 doctors honored by receiving an Associate Fellowship in the United States Chapter, International College of Surgeons at induction ceremonies held as part of the convocation held in Chicago.
