**Committee to Aid Refugee
Children Named in Diocese**

Participation by Rochester Catholic Charities in a nation wide program to care for refugees children was made known this week by Very Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, Diocesan Director in announcing formation of a Catholic Charities Committee for Refugee Children.

The committee is composed of Frank E. Donnelly and Harold Coleman, members of the Board of Directors, Rochester Catholic Charities; Judge James P. B. Dwyer, chairman of the Rochester Committee on Displaced Persons; Monsignor Lambert, Diocesan director; Rev. Dr. Arthur E. Ratigan, director, Child Care and Family Division; Miss Kathleen O'Gill, executive director, Rochester Office, Child Care and Family Division; and George W. Montgomery, of the Rochester office.

This committee will represent the Board of Directors and the Catholic Committee for our programs of co-operation with Refug. Monsignor Lambert said.

"For some time the Catholic Committee, composed of members of the Hierarchy, has been the official Catholic agency for the care of refugee children as well as adults." All Catholic chil-

Appeals to Rochester young stars to avoid Hallowe'en pranks involving destruction and theft have been issued by the Rochester police and the U. S. Post Office.

In a letter to the young people, Officer William H. Keeler, supervisor of the Police School Safety Bureau, urged them not to destroy "valuable and irreplaceable property" in their pursuit of Hallowe'en fun. He called attention to the fact that a loss of \$17,000, wasted because of false fire alarms, and \$1,400 to replace broken street light units, was incurred last year during the Hallowe'en season.

Officer Keeler asks Hallowe'en stars to join in parties at youth centers, playgrounds and community meeting places to "have fun, be happy, and keep safe."

Postmaster Donald A. Bailey, in a public statement, pointed out that much damage to mail boxes as well as theft of mail occurs during the Hallowe'en period for which children are responsible.

He appeals to school authorities to inform their pupils that such acts are violations of the postal laws and punishable by severe penalties.

Bishop To Visit West Indies
London—(NC)—Bishop Edward Myra, Auxiliary of Westminster, will shortly leave London on a visit to British Guiana, the West Indies and British Honduras, on behalf of the Holy See.

"Although the refugee boys in our territory at present are all of Ukrainian descent," Monsignor Lambert said, "we can anticipate the arrival of children of other nationalities. Many persons do not realize it, but the majority of displaced persons in Europe—at least 80%—are Catholic."

"Children are brought to this country as the immigration quota permit. While responsibility for the care of these children remains with the United States Committee, Catholic Charities will provide supervision for all Catholic children who find homes within our diocese."

"Representatives of various nationality groups will be invited to serve as consultants with our local committees in this work."
