It was a sweet victory of revenge for Aquinas because Detroit had beaten the Irish in the three previous meetings and had come to Rochester with a Midwest reputation of power and trickery that was supposed to eclipse the football display which

last year gave them a 23-20 victory.

But all afternoon, the Aquinas line outcharged the Shamrocks and tackled their fleet runners deep in the backfield or spelled them ignominiously along the sideline. The colorful crowd that broke all Rochester records for sporting events yelled "Ho! Ho! Ho!" as Billy Civil, Johnny Della Villa and Ed McCluskey piled up gains of 100 yards against the puny 42 yards that famed Detroit backs could advance.

IT WAS A GAMBLE of thrilling gambles with Aquinas' daring to run or pass when a kick was expected and Detroit spreading its line in an open formation that could lead to surprising end-aways or long passes. But the battle was clean despite the hard fighting and the desperate, spirited play. Both teams were penalized only 60 yards and the infractions for holding and clipping that have plagued the Irish all season were happily avoided.

Although Aquinas scored 13 first-downs to 6 for Detroit, they were dangerous every minute for they marched deep into Shamrock territory six different times but had only enough scoring spark for two touchdowns.

Detroit crossed midfield only twice and those invasions occurred in the first half on long passes which resulted in their sole touchdown. The Irish line smothered the visitors in the last half but Detroit fought back with the desperate passes of their Dick Cleaveland until Aquinas intercepted and held them deep in their own territory until the final gun.

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
