Cause of Anti-Communism Apathy Told At Forum Led by 3 New York Lawyers

The fundamental reason underlying the apathy toward Communism is that the average American is not sufficiently familiar with it," according to James Evers, who opened the anti-Communism forum at Nazareth College Monday evening. This is one of a series of such forums conducted on college campuses throughout the East by three members of the Catholic Lawyers' Guild of New York City, James Evers, Maurice A. Walsh, Jr., and Francis X. Fahy, all alumni of St. Peter's College, Jersey City, and the Fordham Law School.

Mr. Evers maintained that the greatest weapon against Communism is knowledge. "We should know what we are opposing, how deep are its roots, how far it has spread and where it will continue to spread, he said.

In answer to a question from the floor, he said that the best source of such knowledge is the Catholic Press, which is waging a relentless warfare against the Red enemy.

Mr. Evers stated that there are two atomic weapons threatening the world today—the first, a threat to the material universe, the atomic bomb; the second, a threat to the spiritual world, Communism. "That foul-smelling cancer of the twentieth century," in a brief history of Communism he showed how it had originated in Germany with the theories of Karl Marx and how it had been fostered under Bismarck, who used it as a tool toward world domination.

Mr. Walsh and Mr. Fahy, were partners in organizing a recent strike against a New Jersey motion picture theater which showed a film featuring Charlie Chaplin, who is believed to be pro-Communist. Picketed by Catholic War Veterans of Hudson City, N. J., of which Mr. Walsh is judge advocate, the theatre saw its attendance cut by 90 per cent as a result of public boycott.

Mr. Evers, in addition to his lecturing and law practice teaches classes in law at Fordham University.

\$8200 Scholarships At New Rochelle

Over \$8,200 in scholarships is being offered to Catholic young women by the College of New Rochelle, New Rochelle, N. Y.

Three \$1,600 scholarships, a \$4,000 scholarship and another valued at \$300 are to be awarded. In addition to a limited number of 3600 scholarships.

The completed application forms for the scholarship examination must be in the New Rochelle Admissions Office by November 8. Students must apply before that date to the College Entrance Examination Board, Box 592, Princeton, N. Y., in order to take the required examinations on December 6.

Eligible for the scholarships are all young Catholic women who meet the entrance requirements of the college, are in the upper tenth of their class and have a minimum average of 88 per cent.
