Sister St. Ann Final Rites Held

Funeral services for Sister St. Ann Murphy, one of the first two nuns to aid in the founding of St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmhurst, in 1908 were held in Holy Family chapel, Nazareth convent on Wednesday Nov. 5.

Sister St. Ann who soon after her assignment to Elmhurst was recalled to Rochester to care for the late Bishop McQuaid during his illness, died Saturday, Nov. 1, 1947, at St. Joseph's after a long illness.

Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated on Wednesday by the Rev. Philip McGowan, chaplain of St. Joseph's Hospital, assisted by the Rev. J. Edmund O'Brien, dean, and the Rev. Eugene McFarland, subdeacon. Acolytes were the Rev. Jacob R. Hauber and the Rev. Thomas Manley with the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Gelle, master of ceremonies.

Also in the sanctuary were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. Connon, the Rev. John M. Duffy and the Rev. Louis Edelman. A delegation of graduates of St. Joseph's Hospital served as honorary bearers.

Blessing at the grave in Holy Sepulchre cemetery, Rochester, was imparted by Father McGowan, assisted by Father McGowan, Father O'Brien and Father McFarland.

Sister St. Ann, born in Canada, entered the congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1902.

After caring for Bishop McQuaid she returned to Elmhurst in 1909 and again joined Sister Rose Alfre, late superintendent in the work of St. Joseph's Hospital. Placed in charge of the operating room, Sister St. Ann also served as anesthetist until 1938 when her health began to fail.

Sister Thomasina Rites Conducted
Hornell — Funeral services were held Friday (Oct. 31, 1947) for Sister Mary Thomasina Stelly, one of a pair of twin sisters, both members of the Sisters of Mercy community.

Sister Thomasina died Tuesday Oct. 28 in St. James Mercy Hospital, where her sister, Sister Mary Aquinas is superintendent. Sister Thomasina was in the 44th year of her religious profession.

Requiem Mass was conducted in St. Ann's Church, Hornell, by the Rev. Joseph Ryan of Albany. A cousin of the sister, the daughter of John and Matthew Stelly, Sister Thomasina entered the Sisters of Mercy in Rochester in 1901 and took her vows in 1904. During her 30 years as a teacher, she taught at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, St. John the Evangelist, St. Andrew's and Holy Cross schools in Rochester and at St. John's in Clyde and St. Mary's in Corning.

In later years Sister was mistress of novices at the Rochester motherhouse of the community for 3 years before becoming bursar for the order.

For the past eight years she had been in poor health being confined much of the time in St. James Mercy Hospital.

Surviving besides Sister Aquinas are four other sisters, the Misses Mary, Catherine, Anne and Josephine Stelly.

Achilleon Wins Contest Honors

Auburn — Holy Family High School Yearbook of 1947 achieved first place rating in the recent Columbia Press Association Conference at Columbia University.

This award means that the Achilleon, in competition with schools throughout the country was rated FIRST in its class.

The critics cover such aspects of the yearbook as layout, theme, pictorial history of the school and its activities, quality of literary matter and physical appearance.

Schools as far south as Louisiana and Kentucky and as far west as Minnesota were represented at the Conference.

In the Catholic Press Association Contest, sponsored by Marquette University, the Achilleon also received ALL CATHOLIC HONORS, in competition with numerous Catholic publications throughout the country.

Catholic Hold On U. S. Remote
Richmond, Va. — Catholic domination of the United States is "remote" and "a bit fantastic" in view of the fact that there were but 100,000 conversions to Catholicism in 1946, according to the Most. Rev. Lawrence J. Shehan, Auxiliary Bishop of Baltimore and Washington.

In a speech before the regional congress of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine here, Bishop Shehan termed the number of conversions "not particularly impressive."

However, he added, the total "does represent an increase of almost 60 per cent over ten years ago."

Bishop Shehan found significance in the increase because at a time "when non-Catholic churches are bewailing the decline of their churches' influence, it indicates the vitality of the Catholic Church in this twentieth century of her history."

Pre-Marriage Contract On Children Ruled Valid

Geneva — A religious contract made before marriage assuring the religious education of the future children is a legally enforceable agreement, it was revealed in Geneva this week as the decision at Justice Nathan D. Lapham was made public in settlement of a separation case contested before him this morning.

The Geneva judge's ruling in denying a wife's plea for separation from her husband overtook the significant announcement that a religious agreement entered into at marriage is a legally enforceable agreement.

Said to be unique in legal history in New York State, the ruling by Justice Lapham, as a justice of the Supreme Court, emphasized that a marital contract concerning "religious training of children" should be upheld as any other enforceable agreement.

MAKING OF THIS decision in the case was watched because they have effected a reconciliation since the decision.

While the Domestic Relations Law provides that contracts made between persons, including marriage must be upheld in force after marriage, this is the first time in New York State that a contract entered into at marriage has been upheld as a legally enforceable agreement.

Not only did Justice Lapham deny this with the separation plea, but he indicated that the father of their children had a right to a divorce if the mother would not agree to a separation.
