College Offers 10 Scholarships

Ten scholarships to the College
of St. Elizabeth, Convent Station,
N. J., with a value ranging from
\$150 to \$250, are being made
available to young women gradu-
ates of secondary schools.

The scholarships will be awarded
on the basis of the applicant's
academic record and the results
of the scholastic aptitude and
achievement tests or no College
Entrance Examination Board to
be held Saturday, Jan. 24, 1948.

An applicant to be eligible to
compete must meet the entrance
requirements of the college and
rank in the highest fifth of her
class.

Application blanks may be ob-
tained by writing to the scholar-
ship committee. These blanks,
together with a transcript of the
applicant's high school record,
must be sent to the college not
later than Dec. 15. No application
will be accepted after that date.
