In them, by befriending the people and by cultivating their acquaintance and by helping their development.

By giving moral aid, cooperation and encouragement, American Catholics can provide the needed spiritual help for returning the separated brethren, Father Guivelen said.

The lecture was preceded by a devotion to the Sacred Heart of the Feast of St. Joseph. Responses were sung by the combined Junior and Senior St. Mary's societies under the direction of Sister Servant of Mary Immaculate.

Millions in Church Need No Psychiatry Says Sheed

The Catholic Church is daily keeping millions of people out of the hands of the psychiatrists, Frank J. Sheed, internationally-known writer, lecturer and publisher, told a Christian Culture Lecture audience at Aquinas Institute Sunday evening.

"Mr. Sheed's statement came in response to a query on his topic 'Theology and Sanity' during the forum period following the talk.

Asked 'if theology is the science which deals with sanity, why doesn't the Church have more concern with psychiatry?' the Australian replied:

"The psychiatrist only gives first aid. The Church provides the fundamental cure for insanity. She is daily keeping millions out of the hands of the psychiatrists."

In his lecture, the Sheed of the famous Sheed and Ward publishers, brought out the main points of his recent, widely-discussed book, "Theology and Sanity."

DEFINING "SANITY" as "living mentally in the real world," the noted lay apologist emphasized the necessity for seeing everything mentally in relation to God the Creator.

"People think sanity is seeing what every one else sees," he asserted, "but supposing they are all mad?" He said that "the world is very poor at seeing things properly because each person is limited to that little patch under his own nose."

He reminded his audience that the world and everything in it was brought into being from nothing and, consequently, its texture is nothing, in reality.

"The moment one sees the thing which inevitably follows from that realization," he said, "is the moment when one is becoming sane. For, if God made us out of nothing, it follows that He must be holding us in existence from moment to moment. If He should go off and abandon His creations, it would also follow that they would again be nothing."

Man must remake his view of himself and others, and the world in consideration of this fact of his utter dependence upon God, or his sanity is to that extent defective, he stated.

Availing that this composite view of everything in relation to God makes sin ridiculous, Mr. Sheed added. "And there is nothing which so cramps one's style in sinning as the awareness of the foolishness of it."

STRESSING THE need for knowing the purpose of things as directed by God, he called attention to the condition of man as an example of the misplacing of things because of ignorance.

"The primary right of man over and above every other right is the right to be handled as a man. Kindness is secondary. And the only way to find out how man is to be handled is to ask his Creator."

He picked out state education as an illustration of the insanity of trying to use man without knowing how to do it. "Write to your state education department sometime and ask them if they know man's purpose in life and you'll get an answer something like this: 'This department is not concerned with religion and takes an impartial stand on the subject.' It is as if they were saying, 'How do we know what it's for or for that matter what it is. We'll educate it anyhow.'"

Warning that Western Christian civilization is in peril from the inside because it is gradually slipping away from God, the orator explained "Western civilization is a very special thing unlike anything the world has ever seen. For in it, each man has a value of his own. There has never been such a civilization before.

"THIS PERSISTENT thing, which makes Western man thrill in sympathy with the misery and suffering of his fellow men all grew up out of the idea that man is an immortal spirit made in the image of God and redeemed by the blood of Christ. The men who built this culture of ours, built it to conform with this idea of man's fundamental worth."

Outside of Catholics, and the few remaining orthodox Protestants, and Jews, Mr. Sheed declared, "Western civilization has lost this view of man and men will not always go on treating other men as valuable unless the fundamental idea is maintained. It is only this which entitles man to reverence and human beings cannot be trusted with anything they do not reverence."

"The whole of Christian civilization depends upon the apostolate of the man next door," he concluded. "We must re-learn the reality of man and God through theology — then we must tell the man next door."
