Guidance Need Stressed For PTA by Pastor

Hornell — "The need for spiritual guidance is a fundamental reality, not merely a people and sentimental ideal," Rev. Ignatius X. Cameron, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church told members of the Lincoln Parent-Teacher Association Thursday afternoon.

In a talk on "The Quest for Spiritual Guidance," Father Cameron said: "As in any search, there are clues to the arriving at the goal or end of the quest. These clues are crystallized in Christ, the God and Man whose birthday is observed this month.

"In Christ's own words is given the answer to the quest, 'Come to Me' and 'I Am the Way, the Truth and the Life.'"

Man today is making the mistake of seeking how to live, rather than why he lives," Father Cameron pointed out. "If man admits he has a soul, then he must realize that he was created for more than the material world, namely to know, love and serve God in preparation for Eternity."

THE EFFECTS of sentimentality and indecision regarding spiritual guidance is evident almost everywhere, the pastor said. An example he cited is a radio announcer's reference to the "God of your choice."

While a similar remark about "The Church of your choice" is definitely an improvement, it still lacks fundamental sense, Father Cameron stated. "One's Church should not be selected as a 'reckless' it should be the Church of one's conviction, chosen after an honest prayerful search for spiritual guidance with God participating in the hunt."

Father Cameron pointed out that many are not seeking spiritual guidance at all, but are concerned with material standards. This concentration on the material, with its resulting conformance to standards at all costs, becomes a sterilizing force.

COIN BOOKS, best sellers, and novelties are entering to the religious, Father Cameron said, when they present woman as cheap, immature and vulgar, in exact contrast to the ideals which have long been attributed to her.

This desire for brutal realism and lack of respect for our orient today has a strong effect on culture, the priest declared. "When freedom becomes license because there are no inhibitions, American culture will disappear along with spiritual standards."

The first responsibility in guiding children in the infinite quest of the human soul for God rests with the mothers, Father Cameron explained. As a practical suggestion toward aiding children in the development of virtue he advised thorough instruction in good manners, which are an obvious foundation for character development.

Teaching children courtesy, kindness, obedience, and consideration for the rights of others is a practical beginning for guiding the child spiritually, he pointed out.
