Joe Garcia's bowling team in Law 51, the glamour spot in bowling alleys, was the scene of the first half of the Aquinas Home and Home Bowling Classic between Elmira and Rochester, Sunday afternoon, Dec. 15.

The boys from the banks of the Chemung distinguished themselves nobly by bowling in a masterful fashion. Koniak with a game of 234-10-10, totaling 240, led the way closely followed by O'Neill's 236 effort. Hubert's 241 and O'Connor's 212 netting their No. 1 team a 2737 three game total.

Carrying the mail for Rochester was St. Ferris, who performed brilliantly with a 268 three game total. His 243 and 215 single games for the afternoon. Rocco Natale and Gerald Knight, Jack Kinney, performed admirably for the local No. 1 team with 266 and 252 respectively.

Father O'Brien, formerly of Rochester, can trust in form when he garnered games of 200-202-161, for a neat 568. Second honors for the No. 2 team of Elmira fell to Al Morgan who clustered a 524 score. Their efforts were to no avail as Rochester's No. 2 team emerged the victors in their contest by 54 pins. Ed Shelby led the attack with a 271 total and a 228 single game. Jack Hill's 254, Joe Rooney's 244, Cliff Sargent's 214 and Bob Ward's 207 putted the locals a 2282 total to Elmira's 2230.

The No. 3 and 4 teams gave the match the old college try. Marty Herbst came through with a 233 and Maletta's 201, including 226, second high single for the day.

The matches were run off under the smooth arrangements of President Joe Rooney and Perennial score keeper, ably assisted by Sam Walker and District Deputy Trossen.

After the heat of battle, we find Elmira victorious to the tune of 230 pins. The contestants were entertained in the club rooms where cheerful Charlie McMahon, together with Gene McFarland (once again in harness), and assisted by Charlie (High Pressure) Ward and Johnny Pilling, served a delicious baked ham dinner. President Joe Rooney, the suave M.C., introduced the visiting dignitaries and this was followed by Jim Tuomey's recital of the early days of the Elmira-Rochester bowling rivalry dating back over 15 years. 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Five Civil Rights Leaders at Rally
Grand Rapids - (NC)—Bishop Francis J. Haas of Grand Rapids, and four other members of the President's Committee on Civil Rights, which recently formulated the widely-discussed report on America's treatment of its minorities, spoke at a mass rally at the civic auditorium here.

Bishop Haas stated that if the legislative program recommended by the President's committee is to have any meaning in America, each group as the Michigan Council for Fair Employment Legislation must encompass all the facets of a real civil liberties program. The Bishop is honorary chairman of the Council.

He shared the platform with C. E. Wilson, chairman of the President's committee and president of the General Electric Corporation, James B. Carey, CIO secretary treasurer; Boris Shishkin, American Federation of Labor economist; and Channing Tobias, director of the Phelps Stokes Foundation.
