Father Masse Expresses Labor Views

**Calls Taft-Hartley Law
'Bungled' Legislation**

The Rev. Benjamin L. Masse, S.J., associate editor of America national Catholic weekly, believes that the Taft-Hartley Law is a "bungled piece of legislation" which falls when examined in the light of moral principles.

Father Masse presented his moral analysis of the Taft-Hartley Act in Rochester Saturday evening when he addressed the

conference with individuals and groups in the exercise of their natural rights unless the general welfare demands its intervention.

Although the Taft-Hartley Law, like the Wagner Act, gives legal sanction to the first two of these moral principles, Father Masse supported the proposition that the Taft-Hartley Law has actually weakened American trade unions.

STATING THAT the Taft-Hartley Law was aimed at reducing labor's alleged advantages in bargaining power over management, Father Masse argued that there is "no support in the wage-profit trend since 1942 that labor's bargaining power has become stronger than management's."

He cited statistics to show that between 1942 and 1947, the average factory worker has suffered a loss in real wages of \$1.28. Comparing this fact with the profit side of industry, Father Masse said that "present indications are

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**Golden Jubilee Rites in New York To
Draw Diocese Nocturnal Adoration Men**

Rochester diocese which has taken a leading part in establishment of Nocturnal Adoration Society will be represented by a delegation of laymen at the Golden Jubilee Holy Mass of the Society in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, Saturday night, Jan. 21. The men will also assist at a subsequent solemn Pontifical Mass to be celebrated by His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman.

The Holy Hour will include a sermon by the Rt. Rev. Hugh Fulton J. Shea, professor of philosophy at Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C.

Taking a prominent part in the New York celebration is a former member of Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society, Harry P. Spore, who is vice chairman of the committee in charge. He was formerly manager of the Regency Hotel here and of the Willard in Washington.

THE ROCHESTER GROUP will be headed by the Rev. Leo C. Monegan, spiritual director of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society and President Theodore J. Husick.

Members of the Society heard Secretary Joseph W. Shea announce that because a number of the men plan to attend the event in connection with trips to New York earlier in the week and others will remain over until the following week, it has been decided not to charter transportation from Rochester.

Latest departure from Rochester to arrive in time for the 11 p. m. Holy Hour Mass would be the Advance Express leaving at 1:25 p. m. Saturday. Special coach accommodations for the Rochester party can be arranged on this or earlier trains if a sufficient number request it, he said.

BENJ STATED that he is arranging with the Rev. George Legere, S.S., national director for admission to the St. Patrick's Cathedral for all men desiring to attend and for seating the Rochester group.

When the Golden Jubilee observance was announced by Father Legere in New York this week, following a meeting of its presidents and spiritual directors of the Nocturnal Adoration Society in Greater New York, he stated that the first time the Society functioned as an organized body in the United States was during Forty Hours, January 23-25, 1906, in the Church of St. Francis Xavier, New York City.

Father Legere has been in Rochester.

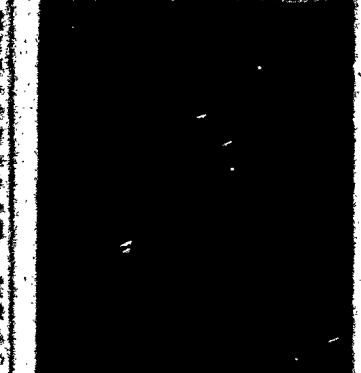

All diocesan women of the Elmira diocese are welcome to attend. The talk will be the



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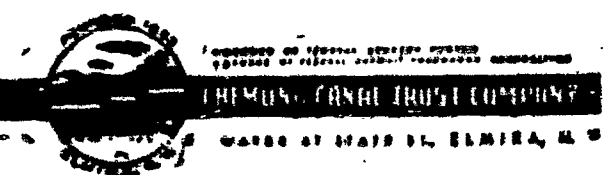
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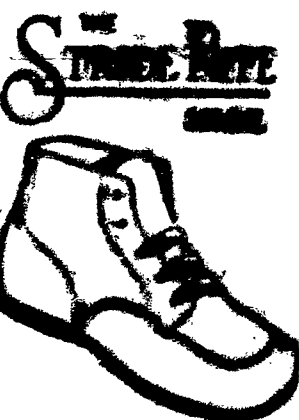


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
