**Art Scholarship Available to Parochial Pupils**

**Students Magazine**, compiled by Shiley, Lindsay and Carr Company, will hold the ninth exhibition of high school art in the Fourth Floor Gallery of Shiley's store from February 8 to March 15.

People attending a public, parochial or private high school in Central Western New York are eligible to submit art work.

Student entries receiving awards will be forwarded to Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to compete for a place in the National Scholastic Art Exhibition to be held there sometime in May.

There are eighteen classifications from oil painting to photography.

**THE LOCAL** or regional award consists of a gold Scholastic Key. Only in Pittsburgh will cash prizes be awarded.

In each area at least one scholarship will be awarded to the high school senior submitting the best portfolio of art work. There are sixty-three accredited art schools throughout the country who are offering these scholarships.

In Rochester twenty-four judges, all of whom are creative artists and craftsmen in their own right, selected the work. Seven of these judges were from out of town.

Sister St. Margaret, art instructor at Nazareth Academy, is a member of the General Regional Advisory Scholastic Art Award Committee. Miss Marjorie A. Lush, Director of Art Education in the Rochester Public Schools is General Chairman of this Central Western New York Regional Exhibition.

**Catholic Youths Lend Aid To Dry Night Club Plans**

Eleven students of Catholic schools are working with the youth committee of the Police Athletic League's new teen-ager's recreation center and "dry" night club.

The young people are from each Catholic academic and commercial school in the city, are cooperating with representatives of the public high schools in drawing up the program for the center.

Originator of the youth project is Henry H. Jensen, coordinator of the Youth Bureau and the Police Athletic League of the Department of Public Safety. His idea was to incorporate a youth center as one of the P. A. L.'s activities.

To house the youth center, the City Administration made available the former assembly hall at Edgerton Park and \$10,000 to rent it.
