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**Final Tribute to Mercy  
Nun Paid in Elmira Rite**

Hundreds of persons, lay people, clergy and Sisters gathered to pay final tribute to Sister Mary Fidelis Demovan, R.S.M., principal of St. Patrick's Parochial School, Elmira, Monday morning, Feb. 15, 1948, at funeral services in St. Patrick's Church.

Sister Fidelis, who had served the Park Place school for 45 years, died Friday night, Feb. 13, 1948, in St. Joseph's Hospital. She was in the 56th year of her religious profession as a Sister of Mercy.

The Rt. Rev. Magr. William J. Ryan, V.F., celebrated the Solemn Requiem Mass, assisted by the Rev. Leo Schwab, deacon, and the Rev. William Burns, subdeacon.

In the sanctuary were: The Rt. Rev. Magr. Francis J. Lane, and the Reverend Fathers Michael Hyam, William J. Naughton, Thomas Toole, Arthur Smith, John S. Maloney, Albert Simonetti, John V. Loughlin, James Lane, Edmond O'Brien, Joseph Hagan, William J. Gayner, John A. Murphy, William L. Reed, and John Chastko.

The entire student bodies of St. Patrick's School and Elmira Catholic High School attended the services.

THE DELEGATION of Sisters of Mercy from Corning, Harnett and Rochester was headed by Reverend Mother Magdalen of the Rochester motherhouse, superior of the order, and Mother Camilla, Mother of Novices. Sisters of St. Joseph from St. Joseph's Hospital, St. Mary's and St. Peter and Paul's schools, Elmira, also attended.

A choir of Sisters of Mercy sang the responses and hymns were members of the community. Burial was in St. Peter and Paul's Cemetery, Elmira.

Sister Fidelis, who had been in the hospital since last June, was retired from teaching in 1933, but remained as active head of St. Patrick's School until September, 1946, when she was succeeded by Sister M. Cecilia. She had been with the parish continuously since 1913 and previously had spent a 10-year period there.

HER LIFE was devoted to religious and educational work and the veteran educator maintained a high scholastic standard in the school. She also introduced new

methods of technique in the classroom. Many of her former students have reached high and important positions in Elmira and other communities.

A native of Cobourg, Ontario, Canada, Sister Fidelis was graduated from Loretta Abbey at Toronto in June, 1893, and then taught in a government school in Ontario.

She received the habit of the Sisters of Mercy Dec. 27, 1900, and was professed by the Most Rev. Stephen Vincent Ryan, Bishop of Buffalo, April 4, 1903, at Batavia.

She came to Elmira in 1907 to St. Patrick's, following four years at Niagara Falls. After a decade in the Elmira school, she transferred to St. Mary's Corning for four years, when she went to the Rochester motherhouse for three more years. In 1913 she returned to St. Patrick's as principal.

Monsignor Ryan, pastor, expressed the grief of the parish over the death of the esteemed Sister of Mercy.

"Sister Fidelis' long service as teacher and principal has meant much in the development and growth of our parish," he said. "Her devotedly to duty and continued interest in the welfare of her pupils have been reflected in the large numbers of St. Patrick's graduates who have achieved positions of prominence in our community and elsewhere."

**Catholic Schools Opened  
For American Negroes**

Washington—(UPI)—It began in September with 80 pupils in the kindergarten, first and second grades. The hope is that each year a new room or two can be added until a full six-grade curriculum is provided. After that the colored children will go to the regular parish schools.

This Catholic school is in a Negro neighborhood in Fresno, California. The story of its beginning is one of many such stories from all parts of the country, related in the 1946 report of the Commission for Catholic Missions Among the Colored People and the Indians.

In Toledo, the Oblates who operate St. Benedict's have been adding a grade each year to their school, and now have five grades, according to the report. Work is now underway on the remodeling of a house next to the church, which would provide two more classrooms and living quarters for the Sisters.

In Levanon, Georgia, deep in the South, a school, convent and rectory were completed. The school opened with an enrollment of 63 children, and according to the report, "gives to a complete plant."
