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Cardinal Backs School Strike London — (NC) — His Eminence Bernard Cardinal Griffin, Archbishop of Westminster, has sent a telegram of support and encouragement to Catholic parents of several Essex parishes who have kept their children "on strike" from school since last September in an effort to secure a Catholic senior state school for the area, it was learned here.

At the beginning of the term, the local education authorities refused to admit the children to the nearest Catholic senior school, St. Ethelburga's, Barking, to which they should traditionally have gone. Parents were asked instead to send the children to non-Catholic schools in the area owing to rearrangements caused by the new Education Act, which was rushed through Parliament in 1944, and contains many snags for Catholic education in the state-controlled system.

"We foresaw the difficulties that would exist in many areas should the school-leaving age be raised," the Cardinal told the Westminster Catholic Parents' association in London. "We knew that owing to restrictions we should not be able to build immediate schools and we did not want our children reduced to primary (junior) schools and the children of secondary (higher) schools directed to a non-Catholic school."

Father Le Buffe is well known in Rochester for his leadership in sodality activities and frequent retreats in schools of the diocese. During this week he has been busy with the Rev. Roger Lyons, S. On Wednesday, Father Le Buffe met with sodalists from Auburn, Geneva and Elmira at De Sales High School in Geneva. This afternoon he addressed a rally of pupils from Aquinas and Nazareth Academy at Nazareth, N. Y.

On Friday, they will meet students of Mercy High School and St. Mary's School Business at Mercy for a day of study and sodality discussion.

New Judge a Convert Salt Lake, Utah — (NC) — Justice Harold M. Stephens, who was appointed chief justice of the U. S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, called the second highest court in the land, by President Truman, is a convert. He was baptized and received into the Church in 1928 by Bishop Duane G. Hunt of Salt Lake, then a monsignor.

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Catholic Refugees Aid England's Church Growth

London — (NC) — The persecution of the Church in central and eastern Europe has, strangely enough, proved beneficial to the Church in England. Catholic ranks here have been strengthened by the arrival of thousands of staunch Catholics who prefer foreign exile to living in their own countries as long as they are dominated by God-hating forces.

The persecutions of the late middle ages stripped Britain completely of faith and faithful. Then another disaster for the Church in continental Europe, the French Revolution with its persecution of religious, cast a wave of priests, nuns and Catholic layfolk on Britain's south coast to sow the first seeds of that Second Spring which later were to grow luxuriantly under Cardinal Newman and the Oxford Movement.

A smaller wave of Italian missionaries came to England after the Emancipation Act of Daniel O'Connell in 1829; and finally growing centers of the new industrial revolution, helping to build Britain into a world power and making Catholicism once more a factor in the land of St. Thomas a Becket and St. Thomas More.

A small influx of Catholics occurred during World War I. Then thousands of Polish Catholics, Catholic DP's, and 30,000 European voluntary workers, helped swell the ranks of the Church during and after World War II. Commenting on this World War II group, His Eminence Bernard Westminster, expressed the hope that they would be allowed to bring their wives and families to Britain, establish homes and stay permanently.

"I always feel that the generosity and charity of the British public both toward friends and former enemies brings a blessing to our country," the Cardinal said.

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
