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Kiwanians Hear Monsignor Cowen

Auburn — Brotherhood was characterized as "the dream of the ages and as of vital importance to mankind" by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William E. Cowen, pastor of St. Mary's Church, when he spoke to Auburn Kiwanians recently in Osborne Hotel.

The Monsignor predicted that spiritual unity, based on faith in God, good will to men, justice and truth will exist despite differences in religious convictions.

"Obedience to the laws of God leads to the way of peace and good will among men of various creeds and races," he declared.

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Loss of Respect For Womanhood Cited As Modern Ill At Sodality Conferences

The "mass movement" in modern education has lost sight of the importance of the individual, the Rev. Francis J. LeBuffe, S.J., field secretary of the Eastern Sodality area declared in an interview in Rochester where he appeared at Sodality conferences.

A veteran of 18 years of youth work, Father LeBuffe deplored the neglect of "the personal touch" which characterizes modern youth training programs and emphasized the necessity for leadership education.

He cited the following four major ills of modern times which are being combatted by the Sodality program: 1) loss of personal relationship with God, 2) lack of belief in God, 3) Communism, and 4) loss of respect for womanhood.

COMPARING TODAY'S crop of youngsters with the past generation, Father LeBuffe expressed the opinion that modern young people are more zealous in the practice of their faith than their elders were at their age.

"Of course," he added, "we had nothing like the magnificent training in militant Catholicism which they are getting."

Another difference between the two generations noted by the Jesuit was the fact that the youngsters of today demand and get the "whys" of everything, where their parents took the word of authority. "It seems to me that this method of developing convictions in children's minds is better than the old way," he said.

Father LeBuffe stressed the Holy Father's insistence on the importance of the Sodality and its program of active Catholic leadership.

MORE THAN 4,800 Catholic students of the Rochester Diocese heard the messages of Father LeBuffe and the Rev. J. Roger Lyons, S.J., of the Sodality Central Office, who toured the diocese on a three-day Sodality Institute.

The two Sodality leaders visited Geneva last Wednesday where they conducted a day-long rally for high school pupils and nursing students from that city, Auburn, Elmira, and Hornell. They spent two days in Rochester.

One phase of the Institute's theme, the status of womanhood, aroused a particularly strong interest among the predominantly feminine audiences addressed by the visiting Jesuits.

Both priests emphasized the point that women, far from being equal to men, must be their superiors, or they automatically fall into an inferior position.

Quizzed as to whether women want their men to place them on a pedestal, the high school girls in every case shouted unanimous affirmations.

Father LeBuffe and Father Lyons also pointed up the neces-

sity of Catholic youth throwing its weight into the battle for better motion picture, radio, and literary standards. "You don't realize how much power you have," they told the youngsters, urging them to use every weapon at their disposal to combat bad entertainment, even the extreme but successful measure of boycott.

Rev. Roy B. Morphy, diocesan director of sodalities, presided at the conferences and introduced the speakers.
