75 Sampson Students Make Closed Retreats at Geneva

Two large groups of Sampson College students deserted their routine school life on the weekends of Feb. 15 and 22 to live a day in the prayer and silent meditation of closed retreats at Our Lady of the Lake Retreat House in Geneva.

Promoted by the Sampson College Newman Club as an annual feature of the Lenten season, the two retreats drew 43 and 32 men respectively to participate in a program of spiritual exercises from Saturday afternoon through Sunday under the direction of the Rev. Thomas Tobin, C.S.S.R., and the Rev. Thomas Sanderson, C.S.S.R.

BOTH RETREATS opened with a unique pilgrimage-procession of all the retreatants walking behind a cross-bearer from the outskirts of Geneva to the Retreat House. During the 24 hours of the spiritual exercises the students observed absolute silence, attended 4 conferences and performed private and group devotions.

Arrangements for the retreat were handled by the Newman Club president, Donald Miller of Ho-Ho-Kus, N. J., and Peter Hardman of Elmira, retreat committee chairman. The Rev. Paul J. Cuddy, Moderator of the Newman Club at Sampson, students' pastor at Sampson, has been a zealous promoter of the retreat movement since his wartime experiences as a chaplain when he arranged many retreats for service men of the Air Corps in Europe.

The Newman Club of Sampson College has enrolled 700 members in 2 years out of the college registration of 4300 students. Nearly 1,000 Catholics attend the 3 Masses celebrated on the eve
