

Famed Mission To Be Rebuilt

San Francisco, Calif. (AP)—Reconstruction has begun on the Mission Santa Ines, one of the 22 missions of California, founded by the Franciscan Fathers in 1777. The mission was destroyed by fire in 1906 and since 1924 has been in charge of the Capuchin Fathers.

Work on reconstruction has been divided into three parts. Immediate repairs to prevent further deterioration; restoration of remaining portions of the mission; and future construction to rebuild portions destroyed by the earthquake of 1906.

The mission was built by Juan Bautista de Anza and for a time was illegally occupied by the Mexican governor of the territory, California's first territory was established there in 1814, but the Franciscan monks were forced to withdraw in 1820 because of severe government restrictions.

In 1944, the mission was designated as a national historic landmark and the West Coast, thus bringing back to life California's first mission.

1,000 Priests Died at Nazis' Concentration Camp at Dachau, Priest Tells Court

Nuremberg — (NC) — One thousand Catholic priests died of starvation and disease or were executed in Dachau concentration camp between 1941 and 1945, according to a German priest who survived what he termed the "martyrdom of Dachau."

The Rev. Emil Thoma, 59 years old, gave this information in the course of his testimony at the Nuremberg war crimes trial of 21 German diplomats, Nazi government officials and economic leaders.

The majority of the defendants are charged with, among other crimes, responsibility for the murder and torture of thousands of Catholic and Protestant clergy, Jews and political and racial persecutes in German and German-occupied territories.

FATHER THOMAS said that he was one of 2,500 priests from Germany and German-held areas who were beaten, subjected to arduous work without adequate food, and deprived of religious freedom in Dachau during the war.

"Old and feeble priests, the witness said, disappeared on 'invalid transports' to unknown destinations, and hundreds of others were executed."

In 1941, Father Thoma stated, priests were allowed to say Mass in Dachau, but Catholic laymen were not permitted to attend Mass or to receive the Sacraments.

Father Thoma testified that he was arrested by the Gestapo in July, 1941, and later sent to Dachau because he had violated the law by allowing four Polish workers to attend Mass in his church together with Germans.

Hans Peters, a prominent German Catholic layman and a professor at the University of Berlin, testified in the same trial that during the Hitler regime Catholic schools and monasteries in Germany were closed, Church property was confiscated and monks and nuns turned out into quarters they could. He also said that out of hundreds of Catholic periodicals published in Germany before 1933 only seven survived the persecution of the "Third Reich."

There in the royal hall of Tara's Hill Patrick won the day—and all Ireland—when High-King Laoghaire gave him permission to preach the gospel of Christ in all the kingdoms of the island.

FROM HIS TRIUMPH in the royal hall of Tara Patrick marched forth to raise the cross and preach the Faith in

every corner of Ireland. Years later, when the fires kindled on Slane's heights had illumined the nation, with the light of Faith, Patrick, climbed a rocky cliff on the bleak coast of Connacht. Here he could view the vast and lonely Atlantic.
