Attorney Views on Schools Given in Wall St. Paper

Entitled "Religion and the Schools," a letter by Anthony Kabatt, Elmira attorney, appeared in the March 15 issue of the Wall Street Journal.

The letter, addressed to the Editor, Wall Street Journal, follows: Your timely editorial on Church and State merits the approval of many interested readers. You might well have added that the Supreme Court decision mystifies our less erudite citizenry which finds, on reading Article I of the Ten Original Amendments to the United States Constitution, that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

The facts, as published, set out that the Board of Education of the city of Champaign, Ill., provided free space for religious instruction voluntarily taken by school children under the supervision of all the churches interested. Since the Bill of Rights, of which the First Amendment is a part, was added to the Constitution primarily to limit federal powers, that amendment applied to a state activity seems to deviate so much from the expressed intent of the original that it can only be interpreted as new legislation.
