"PURPOSE OF the Holy Hour will be to offer reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus for the sins and excesses that are so common in the modern manner of spending Saturday night out," Father Cirrincione said in announcing the services.

"It is felt," the pastor stated, "that even many Catholics are spending Saturday night in a pagan manner to the detriment of Sunday Mass and Communion. Thus, the religious observance of the Lord's Day itself has suffered greatly. This, apparently is widespread since the sanctification of the Sunday was one of five principles recently laid down by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII in an address to Catholic Action representatives from 19 countries in St. Peter's square."

"It is hoped that through the weekly Holy Hour, not only will atonement be made but that many will be led to the observance of both Saturday and Sunday in a Christian manner."
