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K.C. State Head In Newark Talk Hits Red Aims

Newark — The Catholic press was calling attention to the threat of Communism nearly 30 years ago, William E. Burke, State Deputy of the Knights of Columbus, recalled in an address at the annual Communion breakfast of Newark Council Sunday, Apr. 4.

A group of 176 members attended the Newark breakfast in Grange Hall, which marked the first time in more than 40 years that the state head of the Knights of Columbus had visited the Newark Council.

For his topic, State Deputy Burke, who is the youngest leader in the history of the state council, chose "Now Is the Hour." He will preside at the state convention in Rochester, May 27, 28 and 29.

AS FAR BACK as 1919, Mr. Burke reminded the Knights, Editor Patrick Scanlon of the Brooklyn "Tablet" was pointing out the dangers of Communism, then known as Bolshevism.

The same organization which then threatened the way of life of freedom-loving peoples is on the march again today, Burke declared. The power of Communism has increased and has enveloped many nations, he said. He condemned the philosophy which would make of man a mere cog in the machine of the all-powerful state, a philosophy which has become a religion displacing the religion of one God.

Deploring the recent decision of the Supreme Court outlawing religious teaching in public schools, and the decision which overrules the authority of the state to ban indecent literature, the speaker averred that such rulings by the highest court of the land are causing widespread confusion and fear of continued inroads upon the rights of a democratic people.

He urged that every freedom-loving man, Catholic or non-Catholic, give himself to combat these menaces to freedom and preserve this nation as a land where all can worship God in freedom.

"Now is the hour," he concluded, "for every American to realize and to fulfill his patriotic and religious obligations to preserve our country as it was founded."

He is a member of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society, active in the Catholic Speakers Bureau sponsored by Rochester Council Knights of Columbus and is a member of St. Andrew's Seminary Lay Fraternity.

A. O. H. Hear Editor Score Secularists' Fairy Tales

A warning against "the superstition of secularism" was given to members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and Ladies Auxiliary by the Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, editor of the Catholic Courier-Journal in an address at the Irish society's annual Communion Breakfast Sunday.

The breakfast in the Sheraton Hotel followed celebration of Mass at Old St. Mary's Church. The Rev. Michael P. O'Brien, A.O.H. county chaplain shared speaking honors with Father Flynn.

"The Irish are often called superstitious," Father Flynn told the A.O.H. members, "and it is true that they do like to tell stories about fairies. In their imagination they have filled Ireland with fairies but they have never imagined anything so superstitious as a world where God is not important. Only the secularists and the atheists have been guilty of dreaming up anything so utterly fantastic."

The priest-editor deplored the "iron curtain stretching across Europe" and expressed dismay that here in America groups have chosen this hour "to hang a curtain of secularism around our great nation."

"THE IRISH," he said, "know a lot about the 'iron curtain.' Five hundred years ago, despots tried to hang an 'iron curtain' around Ireland and to secularize its people, but it didn't work out."

"The Irish fought against secularization because they understood that if God is not important then man is not important either."

Tyranny and atheism go hand in hand, the speaker explained, because when God is denied there is nothing to stop a despotic government from abusing the liberties of its people.

"Secularism and atheism are superstitious because they foster the myth that God is not necessary in human affairs," he charged.

"There is one decisive weapon against the 'iron curtain' of tyranny and superstitious secularism. This is the terrible truth that God made man in His own image and likeness," Father Flynn concluded.

John C. Crowley, county president was in charge of the arrangements.

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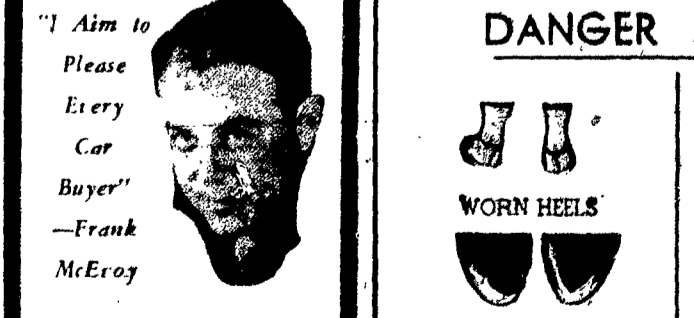
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
