Central N. Y. Newman Club Meeting Held In Geneva

was discussed by Rev. Paul Cuddy of Saratoga, and the Rev. Paul Murray of the University of Buffalo urged more club emphasis on those events which improve the religious, cultural and social life of the students.

IN A BRIEF talk after the 9 o'clock Mass at St. Stephen's Church on Sunday morning, Bishop Kearney urged the collegians to "become schooled to discouragement," noting "as soon as you set active the forces of Christianity, the forces of evil and sin are challenged. That is the history of Christianity down through the ages. It is the price we must pay for the inestimable privilege of becoming apostles of Jesus Christ."

The speaker noted that the particular work of Newman clubs on the college campus is the preservation and development of the faith.

He warned, "You have a mental responsibility. As you advance in the study of science, literature, and other subjects, the presentation of the point of view of those who have no faith like your own may present difficulties. They are the same as have been met before by men of faith through the ages. Conscious of their own gifts, these men have solved the problems."

Following the Mass the delegates attended a Communion breakfast in Hotel Seneca where Father Keller, leader of the Christophers, challenged them to "carry Christ into your work and every day lives."

"You have no idea what you can do," Father Keller said. "You can actually begin your heaven right here on earth. All you have to do to be a Christopher is to be a Christ-bearer. There are no organizations, no meetings, no dues."

Christophers are urged to enter the four vital fields in which they can reach and influence the greatest number of persons. These are education, trade unions, government, and the writing field, which includes writing for radio, television, and the movies as well as for publications.

The basic idea is chosen from an old Chinese proverb, "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness." Christophers are urged to get into fields where Christianity and democracy are being attacked.

The influence of the Christophers is designedly individual, he insisted, sprouting from each person's own initiative to better the world by "the integration of the divine with the human."

At the business meeting following, a Geneva girl, Miss Rita Jennings, was elected recording secretary of the Newman Club province. Miss Jennings attends Cortland State Teachers College.

Other officers named were Edward Riley, chairman; Miss Margaret Devine, corresponding secretary; and Miss Patricia Curtin, treasurer, all of Syracuse.

Delegates also passed several resolutions during the final session. These included a pledge of allegiance to the Church and the Holy Father; a proposal to combat communism by a program of Catholic Action as outlined in the "Quadragesimo Anno"; support of the Straton Bill in regard to the displaced persons; support of the establishment of credit courses in religion in secular colleges and universities; establishment of a regional system within the Newman Club provinces; and arrangement for better public relations with the non-Catholic communities within which Newman clubs function.
