Nation-Wide Peace Ceremonies on Feast Of Sacred Heart Planned Throughout U. S.

Washington—(NC)—Plans are well advanced for the nationwide observance of the Feast of the Sacred Heart, June 4, it has been announced by the League of the Sacred Heart and the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart in the Home, sponsors of the celebration. The feast occurs on the First Friday.

The observance will center around the general intention recommended by His Holiness Pope Pius XII for June, the month of the Sacred Heart, "True World Peace," according to the Rev. Arthur R. McGrath, S.J., League director, and the Rev. Francis Larkin, S.S.C., director of the Enthronement. They have submitted their plans for the observance to His Excellency Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States.

"I HAVE READ with pleasure," Archbishop Cicognani told the directors, "your program for the National Celebration of the Feast of the Sacred Heart on Friday, June 4. The more widely you make known this program, particularly in the light of the Holy Father's June intention, the more magnificent will be the prayer that will ascend to the throne of God, begging Him for that peace which is so intently desired."

Father Larkin said assurances have been received, through personal visits and letters, that many members of the hierarchy will remain their guests and people "that in the Heart of Christ is the only ultimate source of that 'True World Peace' which the Holy Father is seeking for the nations."

He added that literature and suggestions for the observance of the Feast have been sent to all the Bishops. Religious generals and superiors.

The directors expressed the hope that throughout the nation, the celebration with appropriate ceremonies, will be centered in the school and home as well as in the cathedral and the parish. They suggested preparatory novenas, tridiums and Holy Hours, and on the Feast, family Holy Communion, consecration of the home to the Sacred Heart, and other services.

Bishop Oxnam Heads Proposed Radio Network

Washington—(NC)—Plans for a network of evangelical radio broadcasting stations were revealed here in hearings held by the Federal Communications Commission on the claims of 17 applicants seeking five frequency modulation (FM) channels in the New York-New Jersey area.

One of the applicants was the Radio Corporation of the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Church, headed by Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, widely known for his anti-Catholic attacks.

Papers in the case state that while the corporation sought only one broadcasting channel at the time, "its ultimate plans include a network of evangelical stations," and that "it is contemplated that eventually other evangelical religious bodies will join with the Methodists in the control and operation of the proposed New York station."

THE CORPORATION was formed by the Methodist Board of Missions "for the purpose of operating all types of radio stations in the promotion of the missionary enterprises and the whole Christian program." It expressed a desire to use the contemplated evangelical network "to reach out to those of the Protestant faith in the community and nation." However, it was said, it did not contemplate that its broadcasts would be limited to religious programs, and it offered to "make its facilities available to other religious faiths on an equal basis."

The FCC denied the application of the Board of Missions in this instance. It noted that it proposed to provide "a new and different type of FM service," but said it could not conclude that this could be superior or more valuable to the New York listening audience "than the programs of two long established applicants with whom it was competing, or of a third competitor, the Unity Broadcasting Corporation, organized by the International Garment Workers, A. F. of L."

Farley Hails Red's Defeat In Italian Vote

"There seem to be no indications on the national scene that the controversy over the legality of releasing time will affect local or national politics," reported James A. Farley, former Postmaster General and former national and state chairman of the Democratic Party as he visited Rochester today.

Mr. Farley, now a business executive for Coca-Cola Co. and a best-selling author, came to promote the sale of his new book "Jim Farley's Story" and to address the Aquinas Men's Club.

"FRESH FROM" a nationwide trip in which he has heard the political rumblings of many communists, Mr. Farley admitted that the trend of religious instruction in public schools was deplored by most civic leaders. In discussing world affairs, the former political leader predicted that Communism had reached "its high-water mark" in the Italian election. "The defeat was a bad blow to the Communist cause in Europe," he said. "It will have a very salutary effect on the situation in Europe generally."

Questioned about the influence of the Protestants and Other Americans United who in a January manifesto threatened to make the issue of "separation of the church and state" a political challenge before endorsing candidates for public office, Mr. Farley admitted that he did not know much about this organization and thought that their political power was "wishful thinking."

One feature of Farley's book that has attracted wide Catholic attention was his revelation that the late President Roosevelt requested the late George Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago to influence Farley not to seek the Democratic nomination for the presidency in 1936. Farley listened to the Cardinal's plea that it was not a good time for a Catholic to seek national office and then firmly told the Chicago prelate that he had never been asked by any churchman to turn aside from any issue or office which he was interested in. He respectfully refused to honor the Cardinal's request because, he claimed, he knew it was Mr. Roosevelt's idea.

"SINCE THEN," he declared today, "I have never asked any priest what he thought of my stand. But I have had letters and conversations with many bishops who praised me for my forthright refusal to let a churchman interfere with my desire for public office. Cardinal Mundelein and I were friends until he died and I know that he too respected me all the more for insisting on my personal rights."

As a detail of his recent business trip around the world, Mr. Farley commented on the deep impression he received of the universality of the Church. "On the first Sunday of my journey," he said, "I was at Mass and Holy Communion on the Queen Mary going to England. Then on successive Sundays I attended Mass and Holy Communion in London, Paris, Rome, Athens, Cairo, Calcutta, Shanghai, Singapore, Melbourne, Auckland, Manila, Honolulu, San Francisco and New York—always the same Mass everywhere."

Card. Spellman's 25 Million Building Pledge Fulfilled

New York—(RNS)—Fulfillment of a pledge he made a year ago to proceed with at least \$25,000,000 worth of construction work despite high building costs was announced here by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

In his report the Cardinal said construction work proceeding, authorized or scheduled for this year in the archdiocese amounted to \$25,489,000. Also listed was \$25,050,000 in additional projects "presently deferred" because of increased costs or to await adequate funds.

Two of the largest items in his present report of work in progress are the new Alfred E. Smith Memorial Building at St. Vincent's Hospital, including modernization of the hospital, estimated to cost \$6,000,000; and the Archbishop Stepien High School, White Plains, which is expected to cost \$4,200,000.

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
