Improvements Cost \$133,685 At St. Mary's

The Diamond Jubilee of St. Mary's Church, Elmira, finds extensive improvements, totaling \$133,685 in cost, have been made during the pastorate of the Rev. Thomas J. Toole, which began on Jan. 15, 1944.

The spiritual and physical welfare of his parishioners, young and old, have been the consideration of St. Mary's present pastor.

In the spring of 1944, St. Mary's Convent was completely renovated under his direction at a cost of \$10,125. All rooms were carpeted, new furniture, curtains and drapes were installed. A new music room with a baby grand piano was provided. A completely new chapel was constructed in which were furnished a new floor, new pews, new ceiling, new windows, new altar with canopy and drapes.

All the bedrooms were refurbished and individual lockers replaced old wardrobes. A new glass-enclosed porch was constructed on the upstairs rear of the convent building. New lighting fixtures were installed.

ST. MARY'S SCHOOL was completely rebuilt in 1944. Included were new rest rooms, showers, wiring, floors, lighting, blackboards, stairways, painting. A new public address system was installed in the principal's office and all the school rooms.

The hall attached to the school had been condemned so it was demolished and completely rebuilt and made into a gymnasium. Completed in March, 1945, the hall made available one of the largest basketball courts in the city of Elmira. This hall is in use practically every night for various parish functions. Costing \$31,700, it was opened Sept. 24, 1945, for inspection.

Directing activities is the full time Director of Physical Education, Allio P. Quatrano. All books, supplies, pencils, ink, crayons are supplied to the 419 children in St. Mary's School.

Complete renovation of St. Mary's Church was begun in the fall of 1944 when the church was redecorated throughout. All remaining of the original church are the sidewalk, foundation, roof and boiler. Everything else is new including pews, sanctuary, altars, 12 new stained glass windows, baptistry, lighting system. Stations of the Cross were cleaned and reframed.

Installed were a new heating system, enlarged sacristies, side exits and water service was extended to the Church. Improvements included a new front entrance with wrought iron railings. The organ was rebuilt and electrified. Three new statues, one of the Immaculate Conception, one of Mary, Queen of Heaven and one of St. Joseph and The Child were installed.

Church improvements cost \$91,850, bringing the total expenditure to \$133,675.00 to date over a period of four years. All of this has been paid out of current revenues and work was set on for completion.

After four years of intensive effort, Father Toole feels there is still a vast amount of work to be done to complete the par-

Communion Breakfasts at which His Excellency, Bishop Keenan and other outstanding speakers have been heard highlighted the history of the men's organization. Distribution of Catholic literature has been a commendable activity of the Society.

First officers of the society in 1928 were: President, Walter D. Sullivan; Vice Presidents, Edward J. Reidy and Thomas G. Dean; Secretary, John J. Richardson; and Treasurer Jerome C. O'Connell.

WITH A LONG record of service in the parish is St. Mary's Altar Rosary Society. Present officers are Spiritual Director, the Rev. Leo C. Lynch, President, Mrs. James A. Mahon; Vice President, Mrs. Clarence Woodhouse; Recording Secretary, Miss Patricia Crowley; Financial Secretary, Mrs. Alvin J. Frawley; Treasurer, Mrs. Fred Yeisley.

The Altar Rosary Society has down through the years since its formation in 1908 recorded a long list of spiritual and charitable achievements. Among other things the group aided St. Joseph's Hospital during the flood emergency, sent relief to Europe and has been foremost in spiritual works.

Miss Mary Burke was the first president of the society and elected with her in April, 1908, were Vice President, Mrs. Daniel Mulcahy; Secretary, Miss Margaret Newcomb; and Treasurer, Mrs. Anna Mahon.

Boy Scout activity in which St. Mary's parish was a pioneer is carried on by an active committee headed by the Rev. James C. Keenan, Trustee Chairman. Francis Loop is scoutmaster and other members of the committee are T. C. Sayles, Raymond Schultz, Francis X. Moses, Allio P. Quatrano and John Roth.

Another youth activity in St. Mary's parish that has done much for the teenagers is the High School Sodality. Officers are Father Lane, director, President, Kathleen Yeisley, Vice President, R. Jerome Kane, Secretary, Jean Titus, and Treasurer, James Buttick.
