Area Newman Clubs Hear Call to Fight Communism

Geneva — Two hundred fifty delegates to the Regional Conference of the Central New York Province of Newman Clubs held in Geneva Saturday and Sunday

pledged themselves to support "a constructive program of Catholic Action" to combat "the tremendous growth in secular and materialistic philosophy throughout the world as exemplified by Communism."

This was the strongest of 10 resolutions approved by the representatives of all Catholic students in secular colleges and universities of the area. Other proposals discussed and approved contained an endorsement of the Stratton Bill for the immigration of the homeless displaced persons and a firm demand that credit courses in religion be established in secular colleges and universities, because of "the crying need for religious faith through religious knowledge."

Discussion sessions on Saturday and business meeting on Sunday complemented a full schedule of inspiring addresses by student leaders and invited guests who included His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney, the Rev. James Keller, M.M., founder of the nation-wide Christopher Movement and the Rev. John A. Reddington, assistant pastor of St. Francis De Sales Church, Geneva.

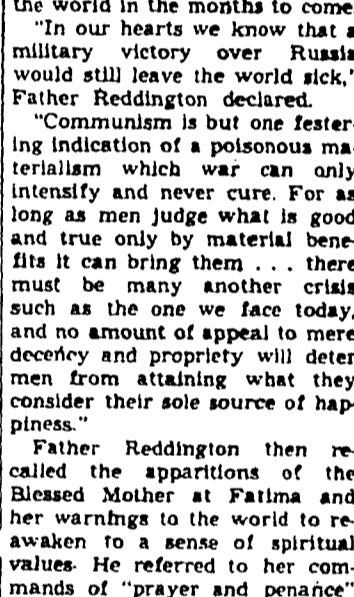
Rev. John P. O'Brien, pastor and chaplain of the Council, will give the invocation. A speaker will be announced later. Frank Shannon is Toastmaster.
