Hollywood The "Yes" or "No" Fight

John Howard Lawson, first of the ten Hollywood movie people cited for contempt when they refused to tell J. Parnell Thomas' House Committee whether or not they are or have ever been members of the Communist Party, was found guilty by a Federal Court jury.

Nine others are still to be tried. Lawson will appeal the verdict which renders him liable to one year in prison and a fine of \$1,000.

The basis of his appeal will be that he, like the others, W. H. Moorings would have answered Parnell Thomas if they had been given a chance. Chairman Thomas insisted that they answer "yes" or "no." Lawson and the rest insisted that they must be given a chance to qualify their answers, and several of them launched into wordy statements which Thomas ruled out of order.

IT WAS EVIDENT at the time that the House Committee's inquiry was not conducted along dignified lines. It looked at the time as if J. Parnell Thomas was missing a great opportunity to raise the level of cross-examination insofar as his side of the inquiry was concerned. He might have permitted the suspected Hollywood reds to grow redder and redder and to argue or rant as they pleased. It might have seemed a waste of valuable time, but given enough rope these men doubtless would have suspended themselves eventually.

Even after they had their long-winded say Thomas could have insisted that they must answer "yes" or "no" to the 84-dollar question, "Are you, or have you ever been a member of the Communist Party?"

Federal Judge Curran instructed the jury that a reply must be "responsive." What these men planned to tell the Un-American Activities Committee offered no direct response but only a vague, general rebuttal of red sentiments, affiliations and activities. If their diodes had been heard, they might have had no such legal ground upon which Lawson now bases his appeal.

They would have said—in fact some of them did say—that as free Americans they had a right to their own political opinions and no other American had a right to question them thereon.

If this attitude had been permitted to go on record in each case, these men, who have been drawing their thousands of dollars a week only because millions of fellow Americans had patronized their films at the box office, might have been asked a few other questions.

Have not millions of loyal Americans the right to know whether these ten men—to whose salaries they contributed—share with them this loyalty to country, or instead are pledged to an alien political creed which threatens their country's safety?

ARE NOT THE rights of millions of Americans of more immediate public concern than the right claimed by these ten men, whose only argument is that they
