A private audience with Pope Pius XII on July 27 as the climax of a week's visit in Rome, was definitely assured this week for Rochesterians planning to accompany Very Rev. Msgr. James C. McAniff on a month's pilgrimage to the great religious shrines of Europe.



Scheduled to leave New York by American Airlines plane on July 4, the pilgrimage group will spend four days in London, three days in Lourdes, three days in Paris and eight days in Rome, plus visits to Amsterdam, Brussels, Lisieux and the hill country of Italy. Return trip by air from Paris to New York is scheduled for Aug. 4.

Excellent accommodations have been secured, the pilgrimage managers report, for all excursions and hotel stops. Besides visits to the sacred shrines, the Rochester group will see world famous art galleries, castles and cathedrals and have adequate time and freedom to tour the large cities.

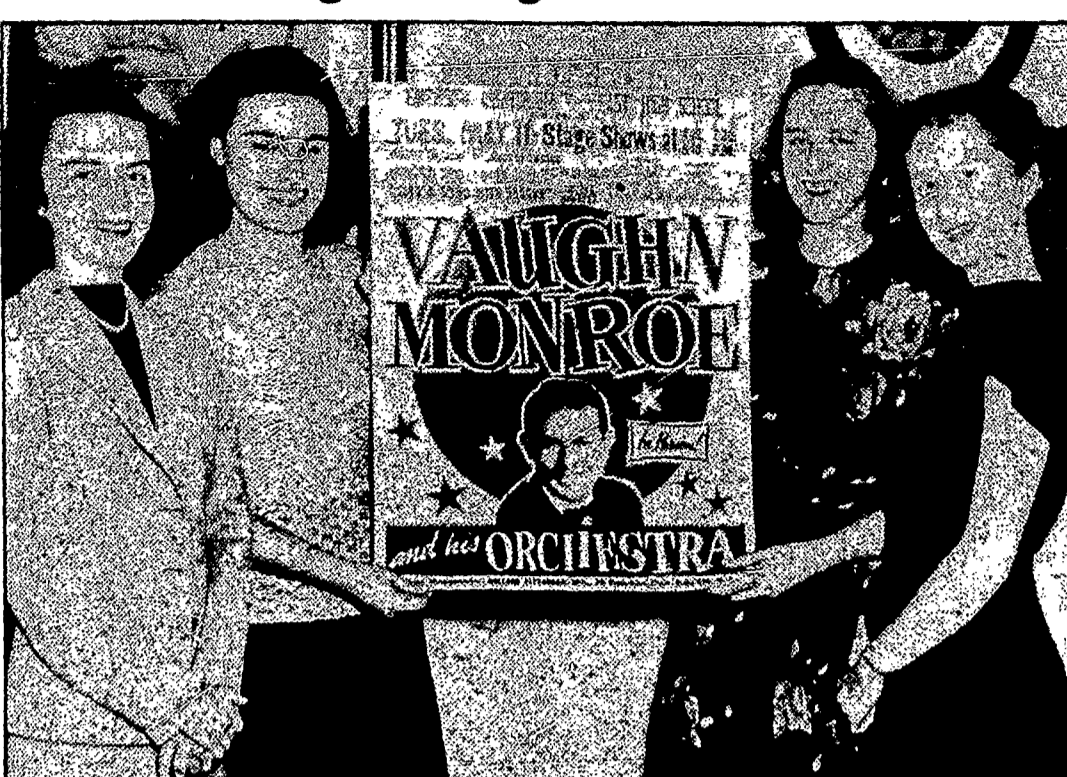

500 Holy Name Men to Attend Elmira Meeting

Approximately 500 delegates from the more than 100 Holy Name Societies in the diocese are expected to attend the 15th annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union on Sunday, May 16, in Elmira.

A nationally-known lay speaker will address the convocation which will open promptly at 3 p. m. in St. Mary's Church Hall, Franklin Street. Ways and means of making Holy Name units more effective proponents of Catholic principles in today's pagan world will be the theme of the business sessions, which will be closed with Benediction.

Arrangements are being made for a buffet supper immediately following Benediction, to which delegates are invited to bring their wives.

Considerable interest has been evidenced in this year's convention, according to Lewis A. Schur, Diocesan Union president, who pointed out that methods of providing services through the new Holy Name central office will be outlined and discussed. There also will be a report on the progress of the drive for old newspapers and magazines being conducted by the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union.

The Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, spiritual director of the Diocesan Union, and President Schur this week urged all Holy Name units to name convention representatives who are to include the spiritual director, the president, secretary and two delegates. In some cases the parish Society is providing travel expenses for its delegation. Other visitors to the convention are welcome.

(Continued from Page 7) those established by the laws of the Catholic Church. The severance of the marriage ties, however, differ greatly as between the Church laws and the civil laws. "The Church recognizes the power of any state to enact laws affecting the marriage of non-baptized persons, provided these laws be not opposed to the laws of God. For instance, different states and countries by their civil laws prescribe the age at which persons may marry. The Church thus recognizes these ages as established by the civil law and obeys them. Incidentally, the legal age of consent for both parties to the marriage in New York State is fixed at 18 years. Those desiring to be married who are under 18 years have to obtain the consent of their parents."

Mr. Gleason explained the differences between a void and voidable marriage, and the conditions of the State regarding each.

Son, Nephew Officate At Rites For Joseph Haffey

Funeral of Robert E. Haffey, father of the Rev. Joseph Haffey of St. Aloysius Church, Auburn, were conducted Wednesday morning, Apr. 28, 1948, in Holy Rosary Church, Rochester.

Mr. Haffey, who suffered a heart attack at his home, 910 Dewey Ave., Sunday afternoon, Apr. 25, died in an ambulance on the way to St. Mary's Hospital. Father Haffey offered the Solemn Requiem Mass, assisted by the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C.S.B., a nephew of Mr. Haffey, as deacon, and the Rev. Earl M. Tobin, subdeacon.

Most Rev. Bishop James E. Keamey imparted absolution at the services. A former Democratic county committeeman from the Seventh District, Third Ward, Mr. Haffey had been financial secretary and business agent of the Rochester Walters' Alliance for the past 30 years.

Mr. Haffey's first job in Rochester when he came here 48 years ago from Brantford, Ont., was as a waiter in Livingston hotel, then financial secretary of the House and the Powers Hotel. He was named secretary of the Walters and Cooks' Union in 1908. In 1920, Mr. Haffey ran for lieutenant governor on the Farmer-Labor Party ticket with Dudley Field Malone of New York City. Surviving besides his son, Father Joseph Haffey, are his wife, Mary; a daughter, Mrs. Carl Keller, two other sons, John and James Haffey; four brothers, Joseph of Beloit, Wis., Edward, of Oliver, B. C., Canada; Patrick of Niagara Falls, Ont., Canada; and Frank of Brantford, and two sisters, Mrs. Louis Bail of Ovid, and Mrs. John Kenny of Buffalo.

Two More Priests Jailed In Yugoslavia

Belgrade — (RNS) — Two Slovenes among twelve Slovians sentenced by a Ljubljana court on charges of espionage. They were Fathers Vincent Zor and Marjan Dokler, who were given terms of eight and eight years' imprisonment, respectively.

The priests were alleged to have turned the bishopric at Ljubljana into a spy center after the liberation. Defendants included two men who were ordered to be shot for working with British and Americans in Trieste, Gorizia and Rome.
