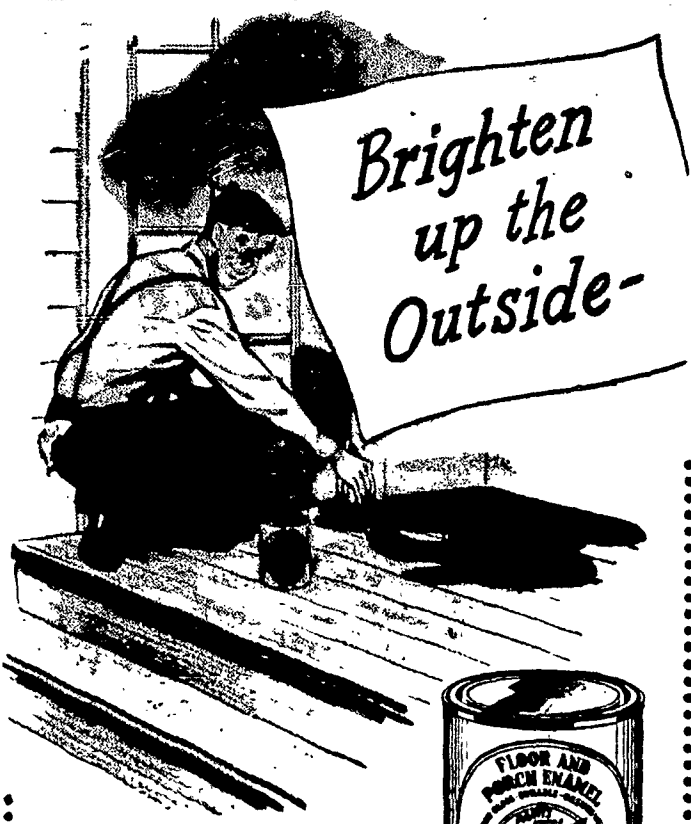

Hollywood The Foreign Problem

At one of their private sessions recently, some of the Hollywood producers who belong to the Motion Picture Association (popularly called "the Hays Office," or "the Johnston Office") fell into a serious off-the-record discussion of certain movies we've been getting from Europe.



They were not happy. They agreed that foreign films like "Furia," "La Bete Humaine," "Jenny Lamour," "Fanny" and "Volpone," sent over from France and Italy could not be made in Hollywood even if the producers here wished to make them. Hollywood's own voluntary Production Code would not permit.

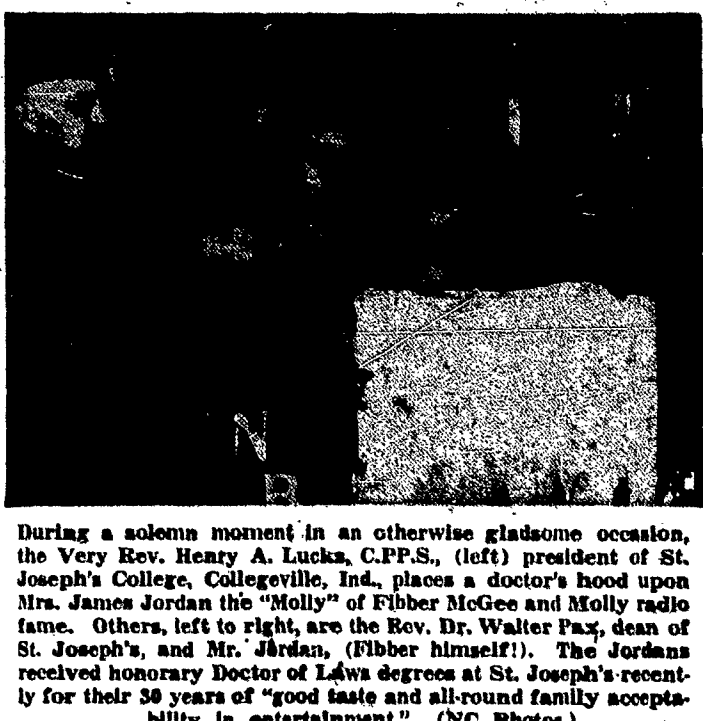
All these pictures and several others, have either been condemned or classified as "objectionable" in part on serious moral grounds. Still they were shown in American theaters. In some instances, even after the Production Code Authority has refused to grant one or other of these films, its seal of approval, it gets shown widely throughout the country.

Columbus, Ohio.—(RNS)—Three religious programs aired over national networks were named for first awards by the 18th Institute for Education by Radio here. They are: "The Eternal Light," "The Greatest Story Ever Told," and "Family Theatre."

"The Eternal Light," produced by the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and broadcast over NBC, was cited for "maintaining high standards in conveying a sensitive religious message of interest to all people in the best traditions of radio."

"The Greatest Story Ever Told," produced by the American Broadcasting Company, was cited for presenting the teachings of Christ in a most significant radio format of superior drama and music.
