First Saturday Club Opens With 200 Women Attending

More than 200 Catholic women gathered for the inaugural luncheon of the First Saturday Club in a scene described by Bishop James E. Kearney as "a touching and inspiring tribute to Our Lady" last Saturday at the Powers Hotel. "The fact that your efforts in starting this First Saturday Club have been crowned with success," said Bishop Kearney, "is an indication that Our Lady is pleased."

TERMINING THE Club a "potential source of grace for yourselves, your community and your nation," the Bishop compared the new organization, which is sponsored by the Rochester Deanery Council, National Council of Catholic Women, with the First Friday Club of the Knights of Columbus.

He expressed the assurance that as the two devotions to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the Sacred Heart of Jesus go hand in hand, the First Saturday Club and the First Friday Club will flourish side by side. He urged that the first Saturday of each month be set aside "as a day of retreat" of prayer and meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary, and suggested the addition of spiritual reading and visits to the Blessed Sacrament to the program of the First Saturday Club.

The story of Fatima, the origin of the Immaculate Heart First Saturday devotion, was dramatically related by the Rev. Albert J. Shamon, guest speaker at the luncheon.

DESCRIBING THE apparitions of Our Lady to the three shepherd children in a pasture in Fatima, Portugal, Father Sha-

mon repeated the request of the Virgin: sacrifice for sin, reception of Holy Communion on the first Saturday of the month, recitation of the Rosary, and meditation on its mysteries.

"Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary is the key that will open the door to world peace," he declared, calling attention to Mary's promise that she would bring peace when a sufficient number of people fulfilled her requests. He characterized the Rosary as "the door-knob that will open the door to peace," and emphasized the necessity of offering up sacrifice and suffering for the sins of the world. "The tug that will open the door is sacrifice for sin," he said.

Stressing meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary, the speaker averred: "We cannot make the sacrifices necessary for peace, we cannot look upon the whole drama of Christianity, unless we look through the windows of the beads of the Rosary."

WHATEVER HAPPENS to the world as a result of the prophecies and requests of the Blessed Virgin at Fatima, Father Shamon warned, will be dependent upon the spread of her devotion.
