With 32 Nazi planes to his credit, Gentle did break Rickenbacker's great record of World War I which was 26 German planes destroyed. Capt. Gentle stated that teamwork is the best road to success and if the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Forces and all other departments of government work closely together as one unit, we will never have to worry about maintaining the peace.

Captain Gentle left Sunday afternoon for Washington, D. C. where he is in the department in charge of the fighter-guns. He was amazed at the beauty of Auburn and was impressed by the overwhelming hospitality of the people.
