Pilgrimage To St. Anne Shrine Leaves July 24

The official dates of July 24 to 31 for the inaugural Rochester Pilgrimage to the Shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre in Canada were announced last night. The mission has as its objective the most famous basilica in North America, which was founded almost 300 years ago.

The annual pilgrimage led by the Rev. C. A. Vander Meulen, C.S.S.C., pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church will leave Saturday, July 24, according to the Canada Steamship Lines, 101 East Ave.

Itinerary for the pilgrimage, of eight days duration, will feature a three-day cruise of the picturesque Saguenay and St. Lawrence Rivers, an sail across Lake Ontario and through the Thousand Islands en route to Montreal. All arrangements for the trip will be handled by American Express-Catholic Travel League, which is receiving reservations and inquiries at 20 N. Division St., Buffalo.

Highlights of the pilgrimage will be two visits from Quebec to the Shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, 21 miles away, one to be made by train and the other by boat. The itinerary also includes the Saguenay Cruise, extensive sightseeing in Montreal and Quebec, and visits to other sites of spiritual and temporal interest.

The entire group will be quartered at the luxurious Chateau Frontenac in Quebec and the Hotel Mount Royal in Montreal.

The all inclusive rate which has been set up for the Rochester Pilgrimage covers every item of transportation, hotels, meals during the stay in Canada, the boat trip from Rochester to Montreal, the cruise of the Saguenay River and St. Lawrence waterway, sightseeing, admission fees, transfer of members and baggage, and many additional services.

Nazareth Sociology Club Elects, Reports Activities

TWO UNDERTAKINGS, one a movie survey to discover what part the movies play in the lives of Catholic girls and the other the collection of blankets to be sent to a girls' camp in Paris, France, have been launched.

To date about thirteen hundred questionnaires have been filled and are now in the analyzing stage and about ninety blankets have been secured. These will be shipped to the proper authorities abroad and the camp will be saved from a forced closing. This is an important contribution to Catholic life in France where competition from Communists is keen in the matter of gaining youth for a cause.

The students found both these activities stimulating and satisfying as practical applications of social theories.

A tea for the field supervisors of senior sociology students was held last Tuesday afternoon at John Fisher Hall at which some 60 guests were entertained. The seniors acted as hostesses under the chairmanship of Miss Catherine Clark.

With summer noonting and fewer restraints normally imposed on children, the admissions of the Third Order Congress to Terriary Parents are cited as follows:

"To imbue children with love for holy purity, truthfulness, moderation and simplicity, to accustom them to self control and obedience to teach them to pray; to bless them daily with the sign of the Cross and holy water; to keep them from publications that are a menace to virtue and to cultivate the habit of good reading; prudently to supervise their associations with others, the family radio, the movie and other forms of amusement; to provide wholesome recreation in their home; to foster priestly and religious vocations; above all to be examples of virtue.

"The Congress also urges husbands and wives to keep in mind that the home should be a sanctuary of the Lord, in which all members of the family come together daily for prayer and the recital of the Rosary; in which holy water is used devoutly and frequently; which is adorned with the crucifix and sacred images; into which the blessings of holy Mass are brought every day."
