A two-story brick building, 200 x 60 feet, the new school is being constructed under the di-Luddy, pastor, at Corona and Warrington Drives, adjoining the church. The building which will provide an auditorium and classrooms for eight grades and a kindergarten will be opened in September. Enrollment is expect ed to be of 175 to 200 pupils.


The ceremony attracted more than 200 persons. The Bishot was escorted by clergy, laymen altar boys and choir girls.
