Dr. Leo Simpson New Head of State Doctors

Dr. Leo F. Simpson, prominent Rochester physician, and honored Catholic layman, was installed as president of the New York State Medical Society at the group's annual meeting in New York City last week.

A member of Blessed Sacrament Parish and chief surgeon at St. Mary's Hospital, Dr. Simpson was honored by Pope Pius XI in November, 1934, by enrollment in the Papal Order of the Knights of Pope St. Sylvester.

In an address before the House of Delegates of the state doctors' society, Dr. Simpson declared that "medicine is now on trial before the bar of public opinion." Reviewing the frequent criticisms made of the medical profession, he pleaded that each county medical group should be rejuvenated.

"If our skills and abilities are to be preserved for the benefit of the sick, it can only be done when each individual member of our society reaches out into the community and becomes a participating figure in activities other than medicine," Doctor Simpson said.
