Los Angeles. — (RNS) — The Rev. Stewart P. MacLennan, Presbyterian minister who married Lano Turner and Henry (Bob) Topping April 26 said here he was "the victim of an unwitting mistake."

"I was unaware that I had breached any rules," he declared, adding that he would stand as his own accuser at a church hearing on the incident. Mr. MacLennan has been accused of failure to adhere to a Presbyterian decree forbidding a clergyman to marry divorced persons before a year after divorce.

Hollywood Rebel in RKO

With a cool \$8,825,000 Howard Hughes has purchased 929,000 shares in RKO. Although his holdings represent only about 24% of the company's total shares, the Hughes deal gives him what is referred to as "control of the giant RKO studios."

For Hughes purchased the particular shares which talk. He becomes the largest individual movie investor in Hollywood.

Howard Hughes now has upwards of \$20,000,000 of his own money. W. H. Mooring has invested in movies. He is recognized by responsible Hollywood movie leaders as a man governed more by determination than discipline. He has professed contempt for the Motion Picture Production Code (the National Legion of Decency) and all organizations and institutions concerned with the same objective of keeping movie entertainment within popularly prescribed limits of decency and decorum.

SOME YEARS AGO when I first met him during a personal interview in London, he told me that "whether the Hays office (now the Johnston office) likes it or not, I am going to make a film of 'Queer People.' In Hollywood they want to stop me because the story shows some of them in an unfavorable light." He never filmed "Queer People" but that kind of talk won Hughes a good deal of press space and sympathy.

Some press men saw him as a zealous young man with a wide streak of candor and honesty in his make-up who was conducting a one-man fight against the Hollywood "Hays Office." This impression was, of course, a false one. He was a rebel, but he also was trying to prove himself a businessman.

In producing an odd motion picture now and again, he invariably exploited his personal foibles to the end of achieving wider publicity for his current movie investment.

Such films as "Hell's Angels," "Scarface," "Front Page" and "Sky Devils," in their turn evoked and in some respects deserved, keen critical appraisal. Until he turned out "The Outlaw" he had never made a dully dull, as well as a morally bad, motion picture. "Scarface" launched Paul Muni. "Front Page" made a great star of Pat O'Brien. These and other male "discoveries" represented constructive contributions made by Hughes towards the advancement of the movie industry.

Results he achieved with a much larger procession of young female talent he strived to sell, were much less impressive. Even Jane Russell failed to justify the at the box-office the ardor of Hughes' publicity. The obvious

TODAY HOWARD HUGHES has, in addition to his new RKO and other film holdings, about seven million dollars' worth of films awaiting public release. His recently put more than \$3,000,000 into "Vendetta" which has given and still is giving him large-sized headaches as a prospective box-office item. He has a further "Then of special interest to those who study the final effects of Legion of Decency condemnation and popular public boycotts, Hughes has still to recover, if he can, \$1,750,000 of the \$2,400,000 he mispent on "The Outlaw." All these facts are of vital interest today only because Howard Hughes, as the big noise behind RKO, may be suspected by many as a potential menace to the self-regulated behavior of the Hollywood production industry.

Personally, I see him in no such sinister light.

AS AN INDEPENDENT producer he could, now, and then, boost his product with displays of personal opulence. The industry did not like this, because it backed to often to injure the prestige of Hollywood as a whole. Now as one of the biggest personal investors in the Hollywood movie industry, he must share the effects of any such injury on the major interests of the whole business.

Moreover he will feel it where it is likely to hurt most; in the pocket.

His new status in Hollywood confers upon Howard Hughes, those prerogatives — including power over production policy — which money can buy.
