



40 Confirmed By Bishop on First Visit To Sampson

Sampson—His Excellency Bishop Kearney made his first visit to Sampson College to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation on 40 members of the Sampson Community, Tuesday. The Bishop was received at the Chapel by a Guard of Honor from the Newman Club under the direction of Donald Miller and Thomas Johnston, past and present presidents of the club.

The color guards, James Cary and John Golden, carrying the American and Papal flags, followed by honor guards Robert Varone, Norman Ford (of St. Monica's Parish), Richard Harold (of Good Counsel Parish), Paul Bucko, Anthony DeLuca, Joseph Karafa, William Nolan and George Thibault led the procession into the Chapel.

The Bishop and neighboring priests, escorted by members of the Acolytes Guild of Sampson, entered the Sanctuary and the Sacrament of Confirmation was conferred on a class of 40 members of the Sampson Community.
