WHAM Reports Public Interest

A policy of greater public service through the expanded facilities of the new Radio City was announced by Rochester Station WHAM in February when the new studios were opened. This week a report on the happenings of three months of broadcasting shows the public interest in radio production. Nearly 64,000 persons have attended broadcasts in the Radio City studio, the station announced, and 65,204 have taken the conducted tour to see the facilities and the behind-the-scenes operation of a radio studio. Over two hundred "live-audience" broadcasts have originated in the new studios and 18 of these were fed to NBC stations, coast to coast. INTERESTED in finding new radio talent, WHAM has auditioned 200 persons seeking radio careers and has formed the WHAM Junior Players group from 40 promising high school students who now present a weekly dramatic show. The University of Rochester and Rochester Institute of Technology use Radio City for weekly classes in radio. The Diocese of Rochester also has shared the facilities of WHAM. On May 1 a special diocesan wide radio broadcast of the Rosary led by His Excellency Bishop James E. Kearney was carried on a half-hour program dedicated to the Blessed Mother to beg her intercession for world peace. Each Sunday at 12:10 p. m. over WHAM the Courier Journal presents "The Catholic editorial point of view on events of current interest" in a 20-minute program entitled "The Sunday Edition of the Courier Journal".

St. Andrew's School Nine Wins Trophy In Holy Name Sponsored Softball Loop

Undeclared in 12 straight games the grammar school softball nine of St. Andrew's parish last Saturday won their 13th and final game and the championship of the Holy Name Parish School Softball League by taking Corpus Christi into camp, 8 to 4, at the Kodak Park field. The well-coached Portland Avenue boys combined good pitching, capable fielding teamwork and consistent hitting to pile up their unmarred record. Evidence of this winning combination appeared in the final playoff, with Pitcher Benny Gerow holding Corpus Christi to three hits—a homer by White, a triple by Ciccotti and a single by Adams. Meanwhile Masucci garnered two hits for the winners, with every other player getting one each. Much more thrilling than the final game were some of the playoff tilts. Highlight of the series was a semi-final 14-inning fray between Corpus Christi and St. Monica on June 11 at the Aquinas field. Tied 4-4 in the fourth inning, the two squads battled nip-and-tuck for the next ten innings, several times getting boys on base but unable to push one across the plate. IN THE TOP OF the 14th Corpus Christi lads scored three runs on four hits, one a homer by White. The doughy St. Monica boys came right back in their final half, sending two runners across the plate on a walk, a double and a single. The two final batters grounded out to end the nerve-ringing fray at 7 to 6 for the Main Street team. Corpus Christi had to battle all the way to reach the finals. Winning the division title in an extra season game over St. Francis Xavier, 10 to 4, to break a first place tie, they dropped a 5-2 playoff opener to St. Andrew before downing Holy Rosary, 9 to 8, in an extraordinary homer by Cliff. Meanwhile St. Monica took Holy Rosary, 12 to 7, then dropped a 13-5 tilt to St. Andrew before bowing out in the 7-6 loss to Corpus Christi. The playoffs climaxed a very spirited season, which several priest directors said was the most successful in the league's history. Besides the championship trophy for the winners, there will be emblematic cups for the division pennant winners.
